


SCENES IN RICHMOND YESTERDAY SHOWING CHILDREN PLAYING IN STREET

SERIOUSLY HURT BY MACHETRY. [Special to The Times-Dispatch.] BRISTOL, Va., June 19.—Chancellor Hall Haynes today handed down his opinion in the case of E. Gouge against T. J. Barrow, recorder of Bristol, a mandamus proceeding to test the constitutionality of the Penitentiary law, recently enacted, by which saloons are soon to be abolished in Bristol, Knoxville, and other cities of Tennessee.

NOT GUILTY OF ARSON.

Judge Waddill Refuses to Admit as Evidence Youth's Alleged Confession. [Special to The Times-Dispatch.] NORFOLK, Va., June 19.—George T. Decker, the seventeen-year-old youth, charged with the larceny of money from the United States Express Company at Old Point Comfort, and with having burned the building on the government pier in which the express office was located, in order to destroy evidence of the theft, this afternoon was found not guilty on the arson charge by the United States District Court at Norfolk. Judge Waddill denied admission as evidence the alleged confession of the young man, it having been shown that Decker was held in a room by a detective for seven hours, and that any confession that he may have made was forced from him. With the ruling out of the confession the government stated that it could sustain no charge of arson against the prisoner.
