BURTON CASE IN HUSTINGS COURT

Well-Known Richmond Man Charged With Desertion and Non-Support of Wife.

The case of W. S. Burton, a well-known Richmond man, charged with desertion and non-support of his wife, engaged the attention of the Hustings Court during all of yesterday's session, and was unfinished when court, late in the afternoon, was adjourned until 10 A. M. to-day.

The defendant denies the allegations and is introducing testimony intended to disprove them. Evidence was introduced to show that Mr. Burton had contributed money to the support of his wife since their separation.

The Commonwealth, on the other hand, is endeavoring to prove that the defendant does not contribute to the support of his wife, and that he is able to do so. The Commonwealth's Attorney, Mr. Mintree Folkes, has associated with him in the prosecution of the case Mr. John Gerland Pollard, representing the complainant, Mr. Louis O. Wendenburg is counsel for Mr. Burton.

The testimony is being stenographically recorded in order to facilitate the making up of the full record in the event of a verdict adverse to Burton. This action indicates that in event of such termination of the case an appeal will be taken.

The prosecution is under a statute recently enacted whereby a man is liable to indictment and penalty in case of conviction for failure to support his wife.

THOUSANDS SEE RUINS AT JAMESTOWN ISLAND

Steady Stream of Visitors to "Cradle of the Republic"---Many Improvements in Progress--- Modern Auto Among Ancient Relics.

Whatever may be the outcome of the Jamestown Exposition, there is no question of the popularity this year of Jamestown Island itself. Since the grounds of the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities were opened free on May 1st, thousands of people have visited the island.

Especially on Sunday, when the Norfolk Exposition is closed, the tourists who have only a few days to spend in Virginia, flock to the old capital and are drawn to the ruins with the greatest interest. The conduct of all the visitors has been unexceptionable, as there is nothing to attract the rougher element. The efficient police force, now seven in number, which gives the beautiful promenade along the entire river-front of the property of the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities, completed, and is in such good shape that that rare visit, for Jamestown, an automobile has been seen almost every day lately on the island.
