

YALE DEFEATS HARVARD IN ANNUAL DUAL FOUR-MILE RACE

SQUEEZE PLAY WINS FOR COLTS

Reeve's Bunt, With Cassidy on Third, Defeats Danville in Close Game.

CASSIDY IN RARE FORM

Allows Visitors but Five Singles and Keeps Them Well Scattered.

A timely single by the much-abused Shaffer, in the fourth inning, which scored Slesbie and tied up the game, and Cassidy's free walk in the fifth, followed by two perfect sacrifices by Titman and Reeve, which pushed the pitcher over the pan, gave Richmond yesterday's game with Danville by the close score of 2 to 1.

Both pitchers were in superb form, the locals getting but five singles and going hitless in the remaining rounds, and the victory being able to lead Mike Cassidy for but five singles, which came, two in the first and one each in the second and sixth and ninth. The one in the ninth was a demon drive to Reeve off Pug Hicks's stick, which took a mean bound and caught the shortstop all in the face just below the left eye, leaving an ugly bruise. Despite the fact that Reeve was badly dazed for several seconds, and was barely able to see, he refused to be taken out, sticking gamely to his task and throwing to Ryan, the next man up, at first. Each twin fanned three batters and passed one man.

Shaffer on the Job. One of the features was a one-hand catch by Fetzler in the eighth, when with his gloved hand, thereby "bobbing Gentleman" Guy of what should have gone for a hit. The work of Shaffer in scooping up all but impossible throws from the infield is also well worthy of mention, especially in view of the fact that even the bleachers and grandstand, when the ball was saved Slesbie from two errors, and Cowan from another.


Besides fielding his position in great style, the Colts' manager banged out two singles, out of three times up. He is also credited with a stolen base, in an ordinary way, when it is realized that "Pop" pliffers a bag about as often as a maiden lady has a birth.

In the seventh inning Loucks turned the remarkable trick of retiring the last three pitched balls. Shaffer hit the first, and Fetzler, who threw the runner out at first, and on the next two over, Walsh hit Fetzler in the right hand, and Cassidy duplicated to McKevitt. Not once in this inning did Catcher Ryan have his hands on the ball after the first man came to bat.

How Runs Were Scored. Danville's run came in the second. Hicks hit to center, and when Walsh laid the ball slip through his legs, the former Richmond took second. Ryan bunted the third strike, and Reggie was thrown out, where the former Richmond then knocked out to Cowan, who booted, allowing Hicks to cross. Doyle was out—Slesbie to Shaffer.

Richmond broke into the run column in the fourth. McKevitt dropped Fetzler's assist of Slesbie's easy out, and the runner was safe. Cowan laid Slesbie on second, from where he scored on Shaffer's hit to left. Shaffer tried to reach second on the throw in, and was thrown out. Walsh fled to left.

In Richmond's half of the fifth Cassidy led off with a pass, and on Titman's sacrifice he went all the way to third, as there was no one there to take the throw from McKevitt. Reeve then worked the squeeze play

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YALE CREW WINS GRUPELLING RACE

Blue Oarsmen Defeat Harvard in Annual Four-Mile Contest.

NEW LONDON, CONN., June 27.—The annual dual race between Yale and Harvard was scheduled to be rowed at half-past 1 o'clock, but at that hour a stiff northwest breeze was blowing, which every now and then broke out into little squalls that would have swamped a racing shell. The big crowd, which never considers the oarsmen, but always wants to see the race, was growing impatient, when shortly before 6 o'clock the breeze gradually died away, and at 7 o'clock, when the two eights reached their stakeboats, there was scarcely enough wind left to ruffle the hundreds of flags that floated from the finest yachts of the eastern seaboard, which formed an avenue all the way up the river for four miles.

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At the three-mile flag, the noses of the shells were zig-zagging, and it was still either and neither's race. Yale had dropped her stroke to 23 to the minute, which was an average of four strokes to the minute less than Harvard's. However, the Boston crew held the big Cambridge eight even until the last half-mile, when the Blue men got their speed and won a magnificent victory over the Yale crew. The whole four miles did the long, graceful shells cease to lap each other. Harvard's rowers were very low in the water, and those who lined the banks sent cheer upon cheer to the grandest races in the history of boating.

Lunt, who replaced Glass in the Harvard shell at No. 6 two days ago, rowed a magnificent race, and because he might possibly have pulled a little more, but he certainly could not have rowed a better race than did the Harvard crew. The time of 22 minutes and 10 seconds, upstream, is the fastest time on record for an eight-oared crew. The record for the course is 20 minutes and 10 seconds, but this was made downstream, with tide and wind.
