

# "GREATER RALEIGH DAY" CELEBRATED

Mayor Jones, Addressing "Outsiders," Urges That Raleigh Be Foremost City.

## EXTEND STREET CAR SYSTEM

Lines Will Be Run to All Parts of Annexed Territory Within Twelve Months.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] RALEIGH, N. C., July 1.—The act of the recent Legislature extending the corporate limits of the city being effective to-day, this is "greater Raleigh day" in the "capital city." The extension makes the corporate limits exactly one mile each way from Capitol Square, and makes the area of the city just two and one half times as great as it has been for the past fifty years. It is estimated that the population is increased from 15,000 to 22,000.

The special feature of "greater Raleigh Day" was a monster barbecue and jollification held this afternoon at the State fair grounds, the citizens of the "inside" territory being as hosts for the "outsiders" territory just brought into the corporate limits. More than one thousand enthusiastic citizens of "greater" Raleigh participated. Mr. Fab H. Bushee was toastmaster, and the principal address on the part of the city was by Mayor James I. Johnson, who welcomed the "outsiders" to the "inside," and assured the new citizen that just as rapidly as possible all the advantages in city improvements would be extended into the new territory.

He declared that for many years the city had tried to tempt or to vote the outside territory in and finally had to legislate them in. And now he hoped and believed that the hands for making Raleigh, the State capital, what she had a right to be, the foremost city in all the State. He announced that within thirty days suitable markers would be placed all around the extended limits of the city by a competent engineer, and that within twelve months the street car system would be extended into all parts of the newly acquired territory.

The response for the "new citizenship" was by Colonel T. M. Argo, who pledged co-operation in every effort for the furtherance of the best interests of the city, and appealed to all to join in the effort to elect only the best citizens to positions of trust and secure the predominance of the best moral influence in the control of the municipal affairs.

There were numerous impromptu toasts, all characterized by good-will and enthusiastic interest in efforts to further every interest of "greater Raleigh."

## COUNCIL WILL SUCCEED BUTLER

Retirement of Former Senator Marion Butler's Brother Has Political Significance.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] RALEIGH, N. C., July 1.—Postmaster Willis G. Briggs announced to-day that on July 15th Mr. Thomas C. Council, of Holly Springs, will succeed Lester F. Butler, brother of ex-United States Senator Marion Butler, as assistant postmaster at Raleigh.

Mr. Council is a young man of promise, a graduate of Wake Forest College. He was a Populist during the career of that party, and has been a Republican since 1898. He was cotton-weigher at Raleigh during the Republican-Populist administration in county affairs and has repeatedly served as a member of the county board of health. He has been for a number of years principal of the Catawba Springs School, one of the most successful in Wake county. He is master of the Holly Springs Masonic Lodge and secretary of the Union Baptist Association. He has long been a close personal and political friend of Postmaster Willis Briggs. Mr. Butler was asked about his retirement, but had nothing to say. The change is taken here to be another confirmation of the reports that have been going the rounds lately about the complete rupture that has taken place between State Chairman Adams, of the Republican party, and ex-Senator Marion Butler, brother of the retiring assistant postmaster.

Conference Committee Recommends That E. K. Victor Be Exempt from Taxation.

The conference committee from the City Council met yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock, and unanimously recommended that Mr. E. K. Victor be exempt from taxation on the property which he recently purchased in order to erect a warehouse, to be used with the one which is already built.

The salary of Lynn Lloyd, stamp clerk, has been raised from \$900 to \$1,000 per year. The one rural delivery carrier has had his salary increased \$100—from \$750 to \$850.


