## SMITH'S WILDNESS LOSES TO ROANOKE

Twirler Throws Ball Away in Tenth, Letting in Two Men.

## WALSH IN GOOD FORM

Holds Men on Bases by Good Throwing—Roanoke's First Two Runs Pure Luck.

After tying the score in the last half of the sixth on a base on balls, an error and three timely singles, and arousing the spectators to the highest pitch of enthusiasm, Subway Smith, who twirled his first game for the Colts yesterday, threw the ball through Gettig to catch Hessler on a double steal between that worthy and Winne Clarke, and the two runners galloped across with the two runs that gave the visitors the game by 5 to 3.

Willis was opposed to Smith, and he held the locals at his mercy, with the exception of the sixth, when, after Eustace had booted an easy drive by Titman, he went up in the air and didn't settle until Richmond's three tying runs had been made. Besides these three singles which the Colts got off him, Willis was found for but one other, a three-bagger by Slettrie, which came in the fifth with no one down. Gettig, Cowan and Walsh, however, were easy outs, and failed to bring Slettrie home.

Smith was wild at times, and was touched up rather freely; but even at that his work could not have been condemned so strongly had it not been for that unfortunate wild leave in the tenth.

In the first place, he should have thrown to second, for Hessler was within a few feet of third when the pitcher turned towards that bag. Even then it would not have been too late to catch Clarke, who was ten feet or more from second and hand-capped by having a bad leg.

Walsh's throwing was all that could be desired. He caught however, in the second, one who was caught in the throw, and it was chiefly his true throw to second to draw Morrison home that made the play successful.

Roanoke's first two runs were pure luck, which was aided slightly by a timely hit. Clayton had singled and gone to second, when Clarke followed with a sacrifice. Fish then sacrificed each runner one bag nearer home, and when Jefferson fielded Morrison's hit to left the ball hit Clayton, who was going home and glanced off to the grandstand, allowing both runners to score, and putting Morrison on third.

Walsh hit, followed by a neat sacrifice and another single, pushed over another run for the visitors in the fourth. Then Richmond tied the score in the sixth, and until the tenth neither could connect. In that inning, however, Hessler hit, went to second on Clayton's out, second to first, stole third, and after Clarke was given his base pulled off the play that caused Smith to lose his head and throw the game away.

Danville's only run was the result of a fumble by Bowen, a sacrifice and hard hit to centre by McKevitt. ## FAVORITE FINISHED SECOND

Cabochan Came Up on Outside at End and Easily Took the Race.

NEW YORK, July 5.—Cabochan, a 20 to 1 shot, won the Spindrift handicap, one mile and a furlong, at Sheepshead Bay today, defeating McCarter, the favorite, by one and a half lengths. McCarter and Tony Faust alternated in the lead to the stretch. Here Lowell Cabochan, came up on the outside and won under a drive. Summary:
