

EIGHT NEW MEN IN NEXT SENATE

Newcomers Who Will Take the Oath of Membership in the Sixtieth Congress.

BANKHEAD GOES HIGHER

Morgan's Successor May Be Placed on Important Committee.

WASHINGTON, July 12.—The election of John H. Bankhead to succeed the late Senator Morgan is an interesting addition to the small company of new Democratic Senators who next December will find seats on the diminished minority side.

Besides those succeeded by Democrats there were four other Democrats of the House to the Senate.

Senator Bankhead is the only new Democrat to the Senate. He had served his tenth term, twenty years in the House, the Fifty-ninth Congress being his last.

Hold-Overs Have Pick.

The death of Senator Morgan and the retirement of Senators Berry, Blackburn and Carmack, leading or veteran Democrats, leaves important committee vacancies on the minority side.

The four Democrats who were succeeded by Republicans were on the following important committees.

Blackburn—Judiciary, District of Columbia, Census, Commerce, Philippines, Interstate Commerce.

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Clark—District of Columbia, Philippines, Privileges and Elections, Gearin—District of Columbia, Patterson—Judiciary, Immigration, Territories.

These are the most desirable committee places left vacant, besides their being a number of minor committee assignments which will be available to the minority.

Bankhead's Good Work. The Senate committee which handles river and harbor improvements is that on Commerce.

Some Important Committees. No vacancy left by a Democrat will be more prized than that left by Mr. Berry on the Appropriations Committee.
