

COVER DISTANCE IN TWELVE DAYS

Fourth Annual Glidden Tour Ends With Nineteen in the Race.

ONLY ONE WOMAN FINISHED

Mrs. Cuneo Completed the Dusty Fifteen Hundred Mile Auto Run.

NEW YORK, July 24.—The fourth annual Glidden cup tour of the American Automobile Association, aggregating 1,570 miles, from Cleveland, Ohio, to the Atlantic coast cities by way of Chicago, and covered in twelve days, was completed today with the run from Philadelphia to Jersey City—ninety-six miles—which was covered in five and one-half hours. The entire party arrived at Jersey City at 12:30 to-day, and crossed over to Manhattan at Twenty-third Street.

Only One Woman In It. Although several women started bravely from Cleveland, the only one to finish with the party is Mrs. Andrew Cuneo. Dressed principally in khaki suits and seated in the big Grinnell machine, the lady made a tiresome sight as they went up Broadway. As the crowd trailed after the machines, the tourists threw cheer and refreshments and cheered lustily. Enthusiastic automobilists greeted the travelers throughout New Jersey to-day.

Exploding a railroad torpedo with a stone, two little girls of Church Hill nearly met their death yesterday morning, and as a result of the experiment both are badly cut, the elder being in quite a serious condition.

Bandaged in a dozen places, with one eye nearly gone, and in evident pain, Louise was able to sit up for a little while yesterday afternoon and give very collected answers to questions with regard to the accident.
