

Henry Nunnally Goes On to Grand Jury on Charge of Assault.

IS BAILED FOR SUM OF \$250

Manchester Ministers to Attend Baptist Association—Mr. Shotwell Ill.

Henry Nunnally (white), charged with felonious assault on Henry Nelson, was before the Police Court yesterday morning, and sent on to the grand jury.

The case is a singular one, and grew out of a quarrel, which originated upon the baseball field. It seems that young Nunnally, who is about sixteen years of age, became angered at something a younger brother of Nelson said, and that he slapped the youngster. Nelson, who is a member of the team, took up the matter, and slapped Nunnally. It is alleged that Nunnally made the remark that he would "fix him, or something to that effect."

When Nelson and some of his friends arrived at Eleventh and Hill Streets, Nelson was accosted from the rear, and was dealt a severe blow over the head with a baseball bat. The Mayor, after hearing the evidence in the case, sent it on to the grand jury, and required a bail bond of \$250. Nunnally is represented by H. M. Smith.

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WORKING HARD FOR LABOR DAY

Committee Holds Session and Decides Several Important Matters.

PROGRAM BEING ARRANGED

Great Street Parade, Headed by a Band of Twenty Pieces, Is One Feature.

An important session of the Labor Day Committee was held last night, and a number of the details for the coming celebration were perfected. It was announced that Mayor McCarthy has accepted an invitation to be present at Idlewood during a portion of the day, and he will, perhaps, take part in the exercises. The chief marshal requests all aids from locals to meet him next Monday night at 7 o'clock at No. 519 East Franklin Street for conference. The committee desired all the stores to close at an early hour as possible on September 24, so that proprietors and employes feeling friendly to labor may co-operate in the celebration. The buttons made originally for designation in order to get into the Fair Grounds will now be given out as souvenirs of the occasion to members of the various locals, since the celebration is to be held at Idlewood.

A special committee was named last night to thank Mr. Sam Cohen, who has charge of the privileges at the Fair Grounds, for his offer, and to explain to him why the celebration will be held at Idlewood instead. This committee is composed of Messrs. Hicks, Pulling and Hawthorne.

Street Parade. Labor Day this year promises to be a most interesting occasion, and the program, which has not been entirely completed, however, will include a street parade, led by Kessnick's Band of twenty pieces, an outing at Idlewood, and the serving of lunch during the afternoon. There will be dancing and games and other forms of amusement.

Mr. John Hirschberg will be master of ceremonies, and Mr. J. J. Powell, chief marshal. The parade promises to be an interesting feature, and it is probable that many public men will participate in it.

The details of the program, however, are not definitely determined upon. They will be worked out from time to time by the committees. Frequent meetings will be held from now until the day of the celebration, and the committees all seem to be working hard for success.
