# Directors Make Bondholders Kick

Richmond Capitalists Who Hold Bonds of Central of Georgia Are Distributed.  
**COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE**  
Fred W. Scott, Chairman, to Ascertain Why Interest Is Not Forthcoming.

## Christiansburg, Va.

NEW YORK, August 29.—Announcement was made to-day that a committee, consisting of the following, had been formed by income bondholders of the Central Railroad of Georgia: C. Altshuler, H. Walter Levy, Ernest Greenbeck, Frederick W. Scott, of Richmond, Va., and J. F. Minis, Savannah, Ga. The committee will meet in this city shortly and outline a plan of action. The appointment of the committee above mentioned is due to the failure of the board of directors of the Central Railroad of Georgia to pay the usual 5 per cent. interest on the income bonds of the road for the fiscal year ending June 30th.
