

BROOKDALE NIMPH MAKES NEW MARK

This Fast Mare Wins Westchester Handicap in Record Time.

TIME FOR DISTANCE

Castlewood at 5 to 1 Wins Two-Year-Old Race—Other Results.

BELMONT PARK, N. Y., October 14.—Brookdale Nimph, carrying 124 pounds, made a new world's record today when she won the Westchester highweight handicap, six and one-half furlongs, circuit track, at Belmont Park.

First race, for fillies, maiden two-year-olds, five and one-half furlongs—Park View (5 to 1), first; Initiator (7 to 1), second; Lady Caroline (11 to 1), third. Time: 1:27 1-5.

Second race, the Autumn Meadowbrook handicap, steeplechase, for horses over five years old, upwards, about three miles—Judge O'Gin (9 to 1), first; Flying Machine (3 to 1), second; Dunsverick (out, to show), third. Time: 1:22 2-5.

Third race, colt maiden two-year-olds, six and one-half furlongs—Castlewood (5 to 1), first; Father's Office (over, to show), second; Omnia (6 to 5, show), third. Time: 1:22 2-5.

Fourth race, the Westchester Highweight Handicap, six and one-half furlongs, circuit track, for fillies, three to five years old, upwards, about three miles—Judge O'Gin (9 to 1), first; Flying Machine (3 to 1), second; Dunsverick (out, to show), third. Time: 1:22 2-5.

Fifth race, handicap for three-year-olds and up, one mile and three-quarters—Miss Crawford (13 to 5), first; Ben Ben (4 to 5, place), second; Kentucky Beau (1 to 2, to show), third. Time: 1:30 2-5.

Sixth race, three-year-olds, selling, one mile and three-quarters, for colts, cranks (6 to 1), first; Gracie (6 to 1), second; Pummy (4 to 1, to show), third. Time: 1:59 3-4.

AERONAUTS GATHERING.

Several Nations Represented Among Contestants for Bennett Prize Cup. ST. LOUIS, Mo., October 14.—The balloonists who are to compete in the international races for the James Gordon Bennett cup, beginning October 21st, are in St. Louis to-night. With the exception of the French and German teams, the Germans are due to arrive in St. Louis on Monday. To test the lifting power of the balloons which will be used during the races, a special meeting will be held at night, when they will be inflated by J. C. McCoy, who will pilot the America in the races, and Captain Charles E. Chandler, of the United States Signal Corps, but the trial was postponed until to-morrow, owing to the number of rains that had been made in the envelope of the balloon during the transit from the East.

Lafferty Wins Golf Match.

WASHINGTON, D. C., October 14.—George C. Lafferty, of the Chevy Chase Club, won from L. L. Harban, a star player of the Columbia Golf Club, in the finals of the eighth annual fall tournament of the Columbia Club. At no time was Harban ahead of his competitor, and only caught up to him when they tied at the eleventh hole. On the twelfth hole Lafferty put better than the Columbia player, and at the thirteenth Harban drove into the ditch. From this time on Lafferty had the advantage, winning out by 1 and 3. In the second round, L. Weaver beat A. B. Lee, 6 and 4. Colonel J. Jay Morrow won a victory over Reeve Lewis in the third sixteen by 1 up for 19 holes. It was a very close contest, as a strong player, as was also Brainerd, of the Bannockburn Club, whom Morrow downed in the morning round.

ACADEMY AGAIN DEFEATED

Second Eleven of Randolph-Macon Proves Two Strong for Local Lads.

Old Rivals to Meet for First Time This Season Next Saturday.

The football team of Richmond College was out for practice yesterday, the first opportunity since the hard game of Saturday against the Agricultural and Mechanical College of North Carolina. The splendid showing made against the heavy Carolinians is highly encouraging to the college, and the men believe that in another game and with one or two points strengthened they could defeat the Aggies. The coach is having trouble strengthening one of the ends, and will experiment with candidates until he gets this point well covered. Willis and Gwathmey are being tested at right end, and if either of them appears to be stronger than the men already tried, the one will play the position in the critical game to come.

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Arrive and Military Ready to Parade.

Southern Railway Has Not Stopped Construction Nor Curtailed Operation.

That construction work on the Southern Railroad has been stopped or that any operations of the road are curtailed, either as a retaliation against adverse State legislation or because of lessened income due to the new rate laws, is emphatically denied by President Finley, of the Southern. The report from Asheville published in several papers this morning to the effect that the Southern had decided to discontinue the operation of the Virginia and Southwestern Railroad owing to lack of capital is by President Finley and other officials termed an absurdity. The Virginia and Southwestern, they say, is not now and never has been operated by the Southern, but by a separate corporation, whose president is J. B. Newton, of Bristol.

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Suspension of Work by Virginia and Southwestern on Connecting Link Only.

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Practically all the team was out for practice yesterday, save Thraves and Williams, both of whom were absent from their strenuous work in Saturday's game. Both expect to be in line this afternoon. On Saturday the Spiders are to meet their old adversaries, the Yellow Jackets from Randolph-Macon, and both teams will put up a strenuous fight for the honors. Randolph-Macon having been beaten by William and Mary Saturday and been unable to score on the latter, there is confidence at Richmond College that the Ashlanders will get another dose next Saturday. This is the exhibition game, the championship game, so called, being played later in the season. Both teams will fight as hard for the game this week, however, as for the final contest.

The team had a fine practice yesterday. Messrs. Louthan, Willis, Gwathmey and Stringer led the team, but regularly well, and all the men played hard. Practice will be continued all this week in the effort to eliminate the weak spots and get the team into the form. Wright at left-end is playing that position in great form, and has developed unusual skill in handling forward passes. The team is making great gains and will figure in all future games.

ACADEMY TEAM BEATEN.

The football team of the Richmond Academy was defeated yesterday by the second eleven of Randolph-Macon College in a game played at Broad Street Park, the score being 27 to 0. The Ashland aggregation was too heavy for the Academy, and they had little difficulty in piling up a score on the lighter men. Halves of twenty minutes were played. The game was witnessed by 100 spectators. Messrs. Paul Woodfin and Richardson served as officials.
