


BUSINESS MEN'S CLUB OPENED YESTERDAY WITH BRIGHT PROSPECTS

Discussion of the negro question yesterday occupied the minds and the attention of the members of the General Convention so that but little was heard with regard to the new bishops for the four missionary jurisdictions in the West.

The Rev. Samuel Hart, D. D., secretary of the House of Bishops, is another who would acceptably fill the office of bishop.



Address of Archbishop. In view of the wide differences of opinion which have developed in the discussion of the negro problem as presented to the General Convention, and the difficulty of securing anything like a unanimous action on any of the propositions pending, the House of Bishops last night decided to make what is called a "split" vote.

Night Session. When the bishops assembled for their night session messages from the House of Deputies were read.

The House of Bishops agreed to make public the address delivered some days ago by the Archbishop of the West Indies, as having a bearing on the negro question, now taking up the chief attention of the convention.

The time has not yet been fixed for the election of the missionary bishops for the newly created jurisdictions.

Address of Archbishop. In other legal matters, one-half of our people are not yet educated, and are not in any real sense under the influence of Christianity.

The other section of the population, which is particularly very well educated, and which is directly under the influence of Christianity, through the agency of the various churches and denominations, is steadily increasing.

The question here arises: Can the black people be relied upon generally, in church and state, at the present stage of their development, or taking an equal part in the public life and government of the community?
