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People Being Aroused. "Though the efforts just outlined are entirely inadequate when we consider our 1,100,000 consumptives, still there has been in the last two years an awakening throughout the State in regard to our responsibility towards the tuberculous. And this awakening may be said to have been caused by the fact that the State has adopted a compulsory registration ordinance, though they nearly all have some cases reported."
