

SCARES HIS BACKERS THEN WINS THE RACE

John Carroll, Heavily Backed, Lets Heine Lead to Finish and Then Jumps Ahead.

COMES IN UNDER WHIP

Has to Be Ridden Hard on Stretch to Regain Position. Other Results.

NEW ORLEANS, La., January 16.—John Carroll, at 1 to 6, gave his backers an awful scare in the fifth race, when he let Heine get in front and hold a big lead to the last few jumps at the Fair Grounds today. FIFTY STAKE RACES

NEW YORK, January 16.—With the closing of entries for the big racing stake events to be contested over the tracks of the senior racing associations, the Coney Island Jockey Club, the Brighton Beach Racing Association and the Brooklyn Jockey Club during the coming spring meetings, a greater amount of money than ever before offered will be assured horsemen. If the money value of the spring stakes at these three tracks obtains throughout the racing season at all tracks—and such is the present intention of the respective managements—a bulk of nearly \$2,000,000 will have been won by jockey stake events by the end of the season. The racing year of 1908 will then have witnessed the giving away of more money in stakes and purses than in any previous year. The year 1908 promises, therefore, in this respect to be a record one on the turf.

ATTACKS DYNAMITE, THINKING IT NAILS

Charles Alperman, Baseball Player, Saved By Official, Who Knocked Him Down. PITTSBURG, PA., January 16.—It is only a matter of extreme good luck that the Brooklyn baseball team has a second-baseman today. Charles Alperman, who holds that position, was as near death's door as he ever will be again without passing through "Whitely" is the Borough of Millvale, where he lives in the winter time. To-day Alperman was putting in time about the building where the Street Commissioner keeps the tools and other junk for the laborers. The Street Commissioner told Alperman to open a box of nails, and Alperman picked out a box that he thought contained them. The Street Commissioner discovered him just as he raised an ax to strike the box. He did not wait, and he swung the ax at Alperman's head. Alperman missed the box the first time, and before he could use the ax again Edward Hickey, the Burgess, who was the catcher, struck Alperman over the head and saved his life. The box contained twenty-five sticks of dynamite, enough to blow down the whole town of Millvale.

REALLY WANTS TO WORK

WASHINGTON, D. C., January 16.—A resolution reading in part as follows, was offered in the House today by Mr. Edwards, of Georgia: Whereas people and business interests in all kinds of enterprises suffering from the panic that is upon us, and the whole country is demanding that something be done for relief, and whereas the House of Representatives has been in session now over thirty days and has accomplished absolutely nothing along these lines, but instead is killing time upon matters that are not nearly so vital; therefore, be it resolved, That at 10 o'clock in the morning be fixed as the hour for convening, instead of 12 o'clock noon, and that the hour from 12 o'clock to 1 o'clock in the afternoon be allowed for luncheon, and that the House remain in session until 6 o'clock in the afternoon, or later, if necessary, in order that we may get down to work, do something for the country, and adjourn before hot weather comes on.
