SAYS CANTEN IS MENACE TO ARMY

Brigadier-General Daggett Declares It Source of Evil That Should Not Be Restored.

Brigadier-General A. S. Daggett, of the United States Army, discussed the "Army Canteen" before a small audience in the auditorium of the Central Young Men's Christian Association...

Having been in the service more than forty years, General Daggett has been able to see what he considers the ill effects of the canteen since its foundation and to note the improvement since its abolishment about seven years ago.

It has been argued, he said, that the existence of a canteen in an army post kept the men from the saloons. On the contrary, he asserted, it almost invariably occurred that as soon as a man got slightly under the influence of beer he went to the saloons...

Showing the first steps toward keeping the soldiers away from the saloons and still doing without the canteen, he told of the commanding officer at Fort Vancouver, who, with the assistance of the women of the post, fitted up rooms for a soldiers' club...

Almost from the first this plan was a great success. Instead of visiting the bar on pay day, General Daggett said that less than 200 of the 1,200 men of the post were in the town...

In view of the excellent condition of affairs since the canteen went out of existence, said General Daggett, the liquor interests have been bending their efforts to re-establish it.

Aside from the ill effects on the personnel of the army, he said that in his opinion, a resurrection of the canteen would be one of the hardest blows ever struck the temperance cause.

Of the officers in the army who have declared themselves in favor of the canteen, he gave as examples General Freytag, Lieutenant Wright and others.


