COMPLAINTS ARE MADE OF EXCESSIVE FREIGHT CHARGES

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 30.—A general complaint of the rate on all classes of freight shipments between Cincinnati, Ohio and Chattanooga, Tenn., was filed to-day with the Interstate Commerce Commission by the Shippers' and Shippers' Association of Cincinnati, New Orleans and Texas against the Pacific Railway Company and the Southern Railway Company. It is asserted that the tariffs on all classes of shipments between Cincinnati and Chattanooga are excessive and discriminating against Cincinnati in favor of Eastern shippers.

Payne, of New York, chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means, to-day introduced a resolution authorizing that committee to sit during the recess of Congress and to gather such information through government agents or otherwise as it may see fit looking toward the preparation of a bill for the revision of the tariff. LEOPARDS IN AUDIENCE

Jump the Barriers in Baltimore, Causing Consternation in Crowd. BALTIMORE, Md., April 30.—During the performance at the Zoo to-night two leopards jumped the barrier, landing among the audience. A boy, Louis Long, was badly clawed about the face and neck, and a panic that would almost certainly have meant the loss of many lives was averted by the prompt action of Police Sergeant Barranger in closing the exit door and allowing only one or two of the terrified people to descend the stairs at a time.

GIVE LIVES FOR POLITICS

Warring Factions in Island of Martinique Have Fatal Clash. PORT DE FRANCE, ISLAND OF MARTINIQUE, April 30.—A serious and fatal conflict broke out in this city yesterday between hostile groups of politicians in connection with the present campaign for municipal elections. A band of men led by M. Labat, the vice-mayor of Port de France, engaged in an armed conflict at the city hall with another band under the leadership of the Mayor, M. Zever. The Mayor was killed in the fighting. Several other men also lost their lives and a number of persons were wounded.

TO OWN EMBASSIES

Bill Reported Making First Appropriation for this Purpose. WASHINGTON, April 30.—The House Committee on Foreign Relations to-day decided to report favorably a bill providing for the purchase abroad of American embassies, location and construction of buildings and providing that not more than \$1,000,000 shall be appropriated each year for this purpose. For this year the bill appropriates \$500,000 for the purchase of embassies at Berlin and Mexico City, and \$500,000 for the purchase of consulates at Shanghai and Yokohama.

LEAVES SANTA BARBARA

SANTA BARBARA, CAL., April 30.—The Atlantic battleship fleet sailed this morning at 6 o'clock for Monterey, where anchors will be dropped tomorrow at 7 A. M. After one day at Monterey the two squadrons of the fleet will separate, the eight ships of the first squadron steaming across the bay to Santa Cruz for a three days' stay. They will be joined at Santa Cruz by the second squadron on May 4th, in order that the entire fleet may be there twenty-four hours, as will be the case at Monterey.

ROBBERS HIDDEN ON TRAIN GET FOUR SEALED BAGS

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 30.—Two men secreted on the New York-St. Louis Express on the Pennsylvania, which left this city at 9:55 P. M. to-night, entered the express car at Wytheville, Tenn., ten miles west of this city, on the Pennsylvania Division, overcame the messenger and escaped with four sealed bags containing currency. The amount taken by the robbers is not known.
