DISTILLERS TAKE MATTER TO COURTS

Object to Several Features of New Regulations Governing Making of Spirits.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 27.—Commissioner Capers, of the Internal Revenue Bureau, has received information from Cincinnati that the United States Circuit Court has granted a temporary restraining order to show cause why a temporary injunction should not issue to restrain the collectors and gaugers from marking the distillers' packages in accordance with regulations issued by the Treasury Department on May 5th last.

Counsel for the distillers, in a telegram to the commissioner here, have asked that in order to avoid the beginning of a large number of suits, he direct the suspension of the regulations pending a hearing in the case. Commissioner Capers will reply that he will not take action until he has consulted with the Secretary of the Treasury on Monday.

The injunction suit was brought by the Clifton Springs Distilling Company. Ever since the matter of marking packages of spirits under the pure food law was taken up by the officials, with a view to the formulation of regulations governing the same, the distillers and others have taken great interest therein, and have frequently entered their protests against the views of the Department of Justice and the Treasury Department.

Object to These.

The features of the regulations to which it is understood distillers specially object are: First. The requirement that where the product of the distillery has been converted into any form of potable, that is, movable and drinking spirits—it shall be marked "high wines." Secondly. The new requirement that all forms of distilled spirits from which substances congenic with ethol have been removed for medicinal purposes shall be termed "alcohol" or "commercial alcohol," instead of, as heretofore, pure neutral or cologne spirits. Thirdly. The products of distillations heretofore marked "whiskey, brandy, rum and gin," will be marked with the particular name of such potable spirit, without any descriptive word or adjective whatever, as has heretofore been allowed.

NO MORE WINE OR BEER AT CATHOLIC PICNICS
