SLAIN AS HEWOOD GIRL ON LADDER Missouri Youth, Mistaken for Burglar by Brother of His Sweetheart and Killed. TALKING TO HIS SWEETHEART Scraping of Feet on House Side Aroused Brother, Who Ran Out and Fired Fatal Shot. HUNTSVILLE, MO., June 29.—Thos. J. Bagby, twenty years old, was shot and instantly killed near here Saturday night when, like Romeo of old, he clutched to the dead young lady's face his sweetheart, Nellie Carter, seventeen years old, the daughter of a well-to-do Randolph county farmer.

He heard from the girl through friends and they arranged a meeting, he to call at her window after the family had retired. Bagby signaled to the girl at 9 o'clock last night and had just mounted the ladder when her brother was awakened by the scraping of Bagby's feet against the weather boarding of the house, and, seizing his shotgun and a revolver, ran outside.

He saw a man's form, half concealed by the vines that cover the side of the house, and fired. The girl screamed, the figure on the ladder swayed and was brought to the ground by a second shot from the pistol. Carter struck a match and went to the prostrate form on the ground, and by the flickering glare saw that the man was Thomas Bagby, the youth who had been forbidden the premises. Other members of the family were aroused by the shots and ran outside.
