

SOCIETY

Although midsummer is considered a period of rest for women who are leaders in their social and patriotic life, it is also a period when plans are formulated and work outlined for the coming autumn and winter. The heads of various organizations, although scattered far and wide, will not fail to accomplish much that will lend an impetus and establish a standard during the season which will bring about reunion and a piecing together of many varying threads of thought and interest.

Mrs. William Ruffin Cox, the president of the Woman's Club in Richmond, has been spending the early summer at her husband's plantation in North Carolina. The literary, history, and, to a certain extent, the social program for the year approaching has been already announced, but many questions relating to the working out of plans proposed will be referred to Mrs. Cox by the chairman of the different club committees.

The Virginia Society of Colonial Dames, of which Mrs. Cox is president, has much work projected that tends to completion next year. Tablets to Chauce, the Indian, and to the Colonial Governors are to be erected in the memorial building placed by the National Society of Dames on the site of the early Jamestown Church, and many historic points throughout the State are to be memorialized.

The Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities has in charge the improvement of the grounds on Jamestown Island and the placing in the memorial building of a tablet to the Rev. Robert Hunt, the priest of the Church of England who came over with the colonists and was the first rector of the little Jamestown Church. Plans along these lines will keep interest alive and stimulate energy.

The United Daughters of the Confederacy, who are always busy, are unusually so this midsummer season, as they are to help actively in the big bazaar that will be given next fall for the benefit of the Richmond Light Infantry Blues. The Confederate bazaar of 1903, the last big event of that kind in Richmond, will serve as a model and set a standard for the women who are to help to make a great success of the Blues' entertainment. There is nothing that the Daughters have at heart which they may not accomplish, and the fact that they have decided to render the Blues all the help in their power augurs the best sort of good fortune for the bazaar. The women of the Confederate Memorial Literary Society are spending midsummer to good purpose, arranging their invaluable historical data. When it is completed the immense value of the work accomplished by the society will be made apparent.

The associate president of the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities and the members of her committee will give tangible proof of midsummer work next autumn, when the Year Book of the association, looked forward to with much interest, will be issued.
