WRIGHT AGAIN SMASHES ALL PREVIOUS RECORDS

C., September 11.—In a flight lasting one hour ten minutes and twenty-six seconds, Orville Wright today surpassed all his previous exploits in a distance flight for a heavier-than-air machine.
