The Common Council held its regular monthly meeting this afternoon, with President N. T. Patterson in the chair.

The clerk read the reports of the City Treasurer and Auditor, showing the cash receipts and disbursements of the city for the month of September.

The Council transacted a great amount of routine business connected with the various municipal departments not of special interest to the public.

Opinion by the City Attorney. The following opinion, submitted to the Council by the City Attorney, explains itself.

Office of City Attorney, Petersburg, Va., Sept. 28, 1908. To the City Council:

By resolution passed in September, 1908, I was instructed to investigate and report to the Council at its next meeting what change or changes, if any, were made in the charter of the city of Petersburg at the last meeting of the Legislature.

As to the term of office of the paid officers elected by the Council, by an act of the Legislature, approved March 15, 1905, the charter of the city provides for a term of two or four years.

That amendment was passed by authority of the Council, and includes only city officers, but not State officers, elected by the Council.

MUCH 'MOONSHINE' IS CONFISCATED

W. T. Flowers, prominent distiller, said to have had goods in possession.

EMPORIA, VA., October 6.—Internal revenue agents, L. F. Hamsbraugh, of Warrenton, and R. M. Meredith, of Richmond, returned from Grays, in Sussex county, to Emporia to-night, after having located and seized a large quantity of brandy without license tax, which was found in the possession of W. T. Flowers.

Several months, it is claimed by many responsible white citizens of Southampton county, in the neighborhood of Arringdale and Capron, whiskey has been freely sold to saw-mill operatives living at and near the two above-named points.

While the elder Mr. Flowers has not actually been placed under arrest, charged with concealing and disposing of unstamped brandy, to-day's investigation may result in the officers bringing this charge against him, it is said.

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CHANGE OF VENUE DENIED BY COURT

Overbey Can Secure Fair Trial Before Mecklenburg Jury, Says Judge.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] BOYDTON, VA., October 6.—Following the examination of counter affidavits, presented by the Commonwealth, and the hearing of arguments of prosecution and defense, Judge Barksdale, in the Circuit Court to-day, refused to grant a change of venue in the case of E. W. Overbey, formerly cashier of the Mecklenburg Bank, now indicted for alleged falsification of his bank statement last February.

Court did not convene this morning until 10 o'clock. Mr. Overbey had secured a number of counter affidavits to the defense's affidavits to the effect that E. W. Overbey could not get a fair trial before a Mecklenburg jury.

Messrs. Jack Lee, R. T. Thorp and E. C. Goode, for the defense, and Major G. T. Risson, for the Commonwealth, made able arguments for their respective sides, and when the arguments closed Judge Barksdale denied the motion for a change of venue.

In doing so, he said he has no doubts as to the high character of the people of Mecklenburg. He said in substance that he had been among them for several years, and under the trying circumstances in connection with the bank failure, they had acted with great forbearance and conservatism.

Immediately after Judge Barksdale had rendered his decision he ordered the sheriff to call the list of jurors, consisting of seventy-six men, out of this number only seven were accepted. The court then ordered the sheriff to summon seventy-five more men to appear here on Thursday morning.

There was another large crowd here to-day. The courtroom was packed. Cashier Overbey's brother, Mr. Robert Overbey, reached here yesterday. All the lawyers engaged in the case are in fine trim, and the trial is attracting persons from all sections of the county.

Court adjourned until Thursday morning.

WORKING FOR BIG VOTE
