GENERAL HUNTON IS LAID TO REST

Imposing Military Ceremony Enacted Above His Grave Before Hosts of Friends.

With all the pomp and display of military ceremony, the remains of Brigadier-General Eppa Hunton were laid to rest in Hollywood Cemetery at 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Beside the regimental array around the grave, there was a host of friends, who came to pay their respects to the man who had played so conspicuous a part in the days before the Confederate War and in the upbuilding of Virginia in the days following the era of the carpet-bagger. Many of them were men themselves distinguished in various walks of life; several were there who had fought under his banner; others who had known him only in his later years. Best in all the group of the line of soldiers drawn up at the grave was the little line of Confederate Veterans, many of whom are standing on its brink. They bore no arms; their time for soldierly action has passed. They were there simply to pay one more tribute to the great one who had been numbered among them and now had gone the way they all must go. Bent and gray, crippled and decrepit, they formed the most imposing spectacle present.

RADIATION SHORT ON HEATING PLANT

It was decided that the conference shall meet again next Monday night, when fuller reports will be submitted. At the request of members from Marshall Ward, it was determined to arrange a rally for Fulton on Friday night, October 24th, the speakers to be selected later by City Chairman Doherty.
