CATON AND DUKE HIT REPUBLICAN SHAMS

Roosevelt and His Yellow Twin, Hearst, Commended for Laying Foraker in the Dust—Richmond Democrats Loudly Cheer Mention of Bryan's Name.

Greeted by an audience which filled Sanger Hall almost to overflowing, Colonel James R. Caton of Alexandria, and Judge R. T. W. Duke of Charlottesville, spoke last night under the auspices of the Bryan-Kern-Lamb Club, and they were both frequently interrupted by applause.

Senator Harman called attention to the meeting at the Academy tonight to be addressed by Governor Swanson, and invited all those present to attend and bring their friends. On the stage were Hon. Thomas N. Williams, of Mecklenburg; Major W. H. Sands, Messrs. W. M. Parrish, W. T. Hancock, John A. Lamb and others.

Colonel Caton said that though the Democratic party dead there had never been a time in its history when it was anywhere near the people. He said it was acting unlike a corpse at this time. He declared that the Republican party had spent much of its time in fooling the people, and was still at its old tricks.

The speaker was vigorous in his criticism of the tariff policies of the dominant party, and asserted that they were responsible for the birth and growth of the great trusts of the country. He said the Republicans had promised tariff reform four years ago, but failed to keep that promise.

He pointed out the danger of the President being allowed to dictate his own successor, and of saying "my policies" will be continued and perpetuated. "It is a threat to American institutions, and the liberties of the people," he added, "and it is time the voters of the country were realizing it."

He sharply arraigned the President for usurping the powers of other branches of the government, and said that some things recently done by him and Secretary Root would have been considered high treason in the olden days of the republic. He alleged extravagance in the expenditure of the public money at Washington, and the creation of \$3,315 new places under the present administration at an annual cost to the people of \$70,000,000.
