

CUBS OUTPLAYED TIGERS IN SERIES

World's Championship Went to Team Putting Up Superior Article of Baseball.

That the Cubs clearly outplayed the Tigers and deserved their recent victory in the world's championship series is shown clearly by the following figures:

The Cubs outbatted their opponents by 251 per cent. They made twice as many sacrifice hits and stole three times as many bases as the Tigers did.

EMPORIA FAIR DRAWS IMMENSE ATTENDANCE

Thousands of People Throng Streets of Thriving Southside Virginia Town--Races Draw Record-Breaking Crowd--Marguerite Wins Free-for-All in Straight Heats--Purses Paid Johnny-on-the-Spot.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) EMPORIA, VA., October 15.—The Emporia Agricultural Fair Association is blessed with the weather. The third day, with the sky again cloudless, witnessed the largest gathering of the Southside Virginia people in a general holiday here.

The marshal's parade again met all expectations. By 11 A. M. the streets of Emporia were crowded with vehicles, many farmers of the surrounding country having made an early start and driven from twenty-five to thirty-five miles to see the races.

The grandstand and its surroundings presented a beautiful sight, being packed with people, as well as the open space beneath and in front of the stand, while the track was lined on both sides of the grandstand by the throng of spectators.

It is the intention, too, to shorten the track to make it a regulation half-mile three feet from the pole. At present it is 115 feet in excess, so that the track record of 2:23 1-4 is equal to about 2:12 1-4.

Breaks Track Record at North Carolina State Fair Meet, but Falls in Final Heat, Losing the Race--Gentlemen's Road Race on To-Day's Card.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) RALEIGH, N. C., October 15.—Four races of more than usual merit were decided during the afternoon. Dillon Queen, the Buttonwood Farm pacer, established a new track record in the 2:18 pacing stake, for a purse of \$500.

The officers of the Fair Association allowed her to be placed in the heat, awarding her second money, and declaring the race finished at the end of the fourth heat. Atlanta Girl, the winner of the 2:25 pace, obtained a new record of 2:17 1-4.
