THE INJUNCTION AND LABOR LEADERS.

Messrs. Gompers, Mitchell and Morrison intentionally violated an order of Judge Wright, of the District of Columbia, and were thereupon sentenced to jail for various terms from six to twelve months.

But in its essential particulars the case is simple and devoid of all necessary implication of partisanship. Briefly, the facts are that the Buck's Stove Company declined to adopt an eight-hour day, and was thereupon boycotted by the American Federation of Labor.

Other colleges have seen the constructive force in character-building that the honor system of the University of Virginia affords, and have tried, not always successfully, to develop that spirit among their students.
