Upholds Tillman. COLUMBIA, S. C., January 12.—The Legislature of South Carolina today unanimously adopted a resolution commending Senator Tillman and denouncing the resolutions which term the "vindictive methods of the President of the United States in his reckless and malicious attacks."

TO REGULATE CHILD LABOR. BILL Introduced in Legislature of North Carolina. RALEIGH, N. C., January 12.—A bill introduced in the House by Representative J. W. Caldwell, designed to regulate child labor in the State, passed today by a vote of 45 to 10.

As a substitute, Mr. Reynolds offered a motion that the plans be referred back to the Committee on Electricity, with instructions to secure the services of an expert electrical and hydraulic engineer to go over the calculations and drawings, his report to be submitted to the Council. An appropriation of \$1,000 is made for the services of this expert.

Mr. Reynolds said he meant no reflection on Mr. Traford or his plans, but that he wished to make assurance doubly sure that the plans were correct. Mr. Whitteer strenuously opposed the substitute, saying that it meant an indefinite delay, and that the plans were one side-tracked to be the last of the electric plant.

Mr. Adams supported the substitute, saying the city had had a sufficient object lesson in the fume. Mr. Bennett responded with a sharp attack on City Engineer Bolling for the fume plans, which was warmly answered. When asked by a member how long it would take Mr. Traford, who was present, said he had worked on the plans eight months, and that he could not see how any engineer could go through the calculations in less than three months.

Mr. Bennett thought no competent engineer would work three months for \$1,000. After extended debate, the motion to commit the plans to the examination of an expert was adopted, 14 to 5, the negative votes
