

SOLDIERS' HOME SUBMITS REPORT

Board Shows Increased Number of Inmates and Low Cost of Maintenance.

Governor Claude A. Swanson yesterday received the annual report of the board of visitors of the Soldiers' Home, presented by President E. J. Hoshner, of the Home. The report shows that during the past year there have been admitted to the Home eighty veterans, and that during the year fifty-six have died. One has been sent to an insane asylum, six dropped from the rolls for cause, and twenty-one discharged at their own request.

The total cost of the property, real and personal, and the maintenance of the Home from its opening in 1884 has been \$17,059.95, of which amount the State of Virginia has contributed \$653,721.67.

For the past year the cost per ration was 17 cents, against cost per capita per diem, \$3.63 cents; average cost per capita per annum, \$140.39. In the hospital department, which is yearly increasing, the average cost per ration has been 27.37, and the average cost per capita per annum, \$267.35.

The contract with the State requires the board to care for 250 men, the Home now having 215 in the Home. During the year private donations amounting to \$2,515.07 were received.
