ANNUAL SESSION BEGINS ON FIRST INSPECTION TRIP

Chamber of Commerce Unites in Program to Entertain Many Visitors.

With the prospect of the largest and most successful session in its history, the sixteenth annual convention of the Air Brake Association opened in the auditorium of the Jefferson Hotel yesterday morning.

The business session began with the discussion of an extensive paper on "Pipes and Pipe Fittings for Locomotives and Cars," by J. R. Alexander, second vice-president of the association.

"Steel, as a metal," said Mr. Alexander, "has inherent superior qualities which give a maximum of strength for a minimum of weight."

Under the head of "Pipe Threads" he goes for the manufacturers. "Steel pipe threads," he said, "is surprising to see the work that is turned out by some manufacturers."

Mr. Alexander made recommendations as to the best methods of testing pipe threads, and urged the use of the best tools. The paper was discussed on the floor by members.

"It is of the utmost importance that the manufacturers furnish dies with correct rake and relief, so that the mechanism will not be damaged."

NAMES PRINTED THREE TIMES

Waste of Money in System of Preparing List of Qualified Voters.

COST THREE TIMES AS MUCH

Possible Delay Suggests Wisdom of Postponing Primary Ordered for June 24.

Because those in authority in Richmond have adopted a method for printing the lists of qualified voters different from that in vogue in other sections, there appears to be serious doubt as to whether it will be possible for the printer to get the lists ready for the municipal primary, which is scheduled to take place on June 24.

The clerk, within ten days from the receipt of the list, shall make and certify a sufficient number of copies thereof, and shall deliver one copy for each voting place in his county or city to the sheriff of the county or the sergeant of the city, whose duty it shall be to post one copy of the list at each of the voting places, and within ten days from the receipt thereof to make return in oath to the clerk as to the places where and dates at which said copies were respectively posted.

It will be observed that the law says nothing about making triplicate lists of the names. The Richmond system, which, however, is different from any in the State, except the one in the counties of Henrico and Henning, is to print the name of the voter three times, showing under three separate heads whether he has paid his poll taxes for each of the three separate years.

It is the contention of many well-patched lawyers and politicians that such a construction is an unwarranted stretching of the law, and that those counties and cities that are printing the single lists are keeping strictly within the bounds.

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BEST RESULTS BY COMBINED EFFORT

New Home of Associated Charities Formally Opened, and Plans Explained.

RECALL KING'S VISIT THERE

Rooms Cleaned and Renovated by Inmates, Thousands of Whom Are Fed.

Those who attended the formal opening of the Associated Charities building yesterday afternoon expressed gratification that Richmond is able to boast of a home so admirably equipped for undertaking the great work of relief among the poorer classes.

Many of those present remembered when the old Ballard House, years ago, was the centre of social gatherings, and some of them attended a reception given in the apartment building on the second floor in honor of Prince Edward of Wales, now King Edward.

There is ample room for the conduct of social and recreational work of the Associated Charities. The Rev. James Buchanan, the superintendent, and his assistants undertook the task of showing the many visitors over every floor. Every passage-way and every room is kept in the most immaculate condition as one requirement of the male who seek refuge there is that they shall, in return for board and lodging, perform certain duties assigned them.

Before the visitors started through the building a brief service was held in the assembly hall. The Rev. E. N. Calhach, of the Baptist Synagogue, made the opening prayer. The Rev. J. B. Branch, the superintendent, and his assistants undertook the task of showing the many visitors over every floor.

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
