Mother Returns From Church to Find Them Stolen During Her Absence.

DANVILLE, VA., May 19.—While their mother, Mrs. Louisa White, was attending services at church Sunday morning, her two little boys, aged five and three years, were kidnaped by their father, Bruce White, a carpenter of this city, who took them to Lynchburg.

When she returned from worship, and started immediately in pursuit, she located the children at the home of her father-in-law, Sam White. Her husband turned a deaf ear to her pleadings, and refused to give up the children, who at the sight of their mother, cried and begged to be allowed to go to her.
