Fifteen Hundred Fans Brave Cold, Drizzling Rain and See Great Game.

Fifteen hundred fanatics braved a drizzling rain and a chilling wind to see the Champions and the Truckers clash again yesterday afternoon, and they were treated to the classiest exhibition seen on Broad Street Park since the Red Sox were in our midst at the opening of the season. Although the field was wet and soggy and the temperature was more benumbing a day in November than one in May, both teams played great ball throughout, only one miscue being made in the entire game. The frisky Colts won handsily by hammering Bob Foxen for thirteen hits. Score: Richmond, 5; Portsmouth, 1. Curtis Walker was on the firing line for the home talent, and proved himself to be the king of the cold weather pitchers. He let the champions down in four widely separated singles, and seven of them fell victims to his crooked shoots. He passed only two men, one of them being left at the midway station, while "Pop" Messitt killed the other two. The Truckers were not so fortunate in the condition of the field, the cold weather and the wet ball. Walker's record for the day is an unusually good one.

Bob Foxen, brother of the pitcher of the Philadelphia National League team, had perfect control, but the Champions took very kindly to his offerings, and they failed to hit him in only one inning. Even Walker got two safe drives. Well, the Colts had to do something to keep themselves warm.

Walker McCauley, who stacked up against a ten plunk fine Thursday afternoon, was back on the job again, and he was as mild and tame as any lamb that ever grazed in a pasture. And Manager Lipe and Arthur Smith successfully worked the same play on him yesterday that they worked Thursday.



RANDOLPH-MACON HAD FAST TEAM THIS SEASON

Yellow Jackets Won Thirteen of Nineteen Games and Captured Championship Cup

LANCASTER WAS THE STAR HITTER

Fast Third Baseman Broke Up Many Games—"Eli" Gravelly Pitched Great Ball Throughout Spring—Pritchard All Around Fast Man.

ASHLAND, VA., May 22.—With the victory over the speedy Hampden-Sidney team at Richmond Wednesday, Randolph-Macon College won the championship cup of the Eastern Virginia Athletic Association, and closed one of the most successful seasons in the history of the college. The team has made an excellent record this spring, winning thirteen of the sixteen games played. It has met some of the fastest college nine in Virginia and North Carolina, and failed to score on only one of them—the University of Virginia. And the variety had a hard fight to win that game, the score being 1 to 0.

The Yellow Jackets met with but one real surprise during the season. That was its defeat by the Williams and Mary team in Richmond during the championship series.

Randolph-Macon defeated the Tigers of the Peninsula in the anti-season game, and was looked upon as a sure winner in the championship engagement. However, the team suffered an awful slump in batting in that match. Hall holding the men to three scattered hits. A week later Richmond College, which had twice fallen before the Ashlanders, hammered Hall all over the lot, winning from the Tigers by 12 to 4.

Both games with Hampden-Sidney were no sure of victory on either side. In the first game, Lancaster, the winner in the championship engagement, however, the team suffered an awful slump in batting in that match. Hall holding the men to three scattered hits. A week later Richmond College, which had twice fallen before the Ashlanders, hammered Hall all over the lot, winning from the Tigers by 12 to 4.

There were only three new men on the team this year—Second Baseman Gillette, Left Fielder Cox and Pitcher Smith. With eight of last year's men in line, Coach Rice Warren was able to get the team in working shape in a very short time. He knew the capabilities of nearly every man at the start of the season, and he worked them into a team that played the University of Virginia a 1 to 0 contest in its first try-out of the season. In the championship games that followed the Yellow Jackets won from their rival, Trinity College, by 4 to 1, but lost the game to Wake Forest. Later, however, they twice defeated Wake Forest at Ashland.

Except for an awful slump in the game with the Union Theological Seminary and a wondrous game of strategy played against Richmond College in Ashland, the nine played consistent ball throughout the spring. While not a strong batting aggregation, hits were made when they counted for runs, and therein lies the secret of the victories. Lancaster and Pritchard broke up several games in the ninth inning by heavy wallops in unprotected spots.

Much credit is due Coach Warren for the success of the team this year. Besides developing the individual players, he trained the team on "slide play" and at this it was particularly strong. He showed himself to be an able general, and pulled many a game out of the fire by switching pitchers at the proper moment.
