VICTIMS TERRIBLY BURNED OVER BODY

All of them were fearfully burned about the head, face, arms and body. Some of them lost most of their hair and eyebrows. All had skin burns, though they are not believed to be serious.

Everybody was in the cabin below when the explosion occurred. When the shock came and the launch burst asunder from the escaping gas, they sprang through the window into the river, all covered with the seething oil.

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It is difficult to ascertain how the accident occurred. But as the tank contained about 150 gallons of gasoline, it is believed that some of it ran over into the huge tin which a match or lighted cigarette was carelessly thrown.

ATTACKED SENTRY

Military Convict Fatally Injured in Attempt to Escape. JUNCTION CITY, MO., June 26.—At Fort Riley, near here, to-day two military convicts, August T. Carey and Harry J. Jeffries, attacked a sentry and in the struggle that ensued Jeffries was shot through the stomach and died later. Carey escaped, but was recaptured. The wounded sentry is Abraham Ciruclink, Troop E, Seventh Cavalry. The men were working in the quarry and attacked the sentry in an attempt to escape.




Yellow Sulphur Social News.
