JAPANESE SCHOONER SEIZED

Vigilance of Revenue Cutter Service. WASHINGTON, D. C., August 3.—The vigilance of the United States revenue cutter service is making sea-poaching a dangerous business. The Japanese schooner Tenyu Maru in Bering Sea by the cutter Perry, mentioned in the press dispatches, was received today at the Treasury Department. The commander of the cutter in his report of the affair says: "Perry arrived at Unalakleet, Alaska, on 11th of July with seized Japanese schooner Tenyu Maru and seventeen men. Trial was had before Commissioner at that place and resulted in the master and crew being held for trial at the next term of court at Valdez, Alaska. "The schooner was seized for illegally taking fur seals within territorial waters, vicinity of the Pribilof Islands."

COUNCIL TO VOTE ON ELECTRIC AWARD

Effort Will Be Made to Secure More Light on Involved Situation.

An adjourned meeting of the Common Council to-night will settle the question of award of contract for the municipal electric plant. Members are reticent in expressing their views on the proposition. Opposition to the award is known to be growing. There was some effort to count noses at the meeting on Monday night and one of two members wished to leave during the session were urged to stay and vote for the award in case the result should be close. When it became evident, however, that the report of the Electricity Committee could not be reached that night, and an adjournment was taken, there was a general feeling of relief that the anticipated fight had come off, and each side would have time to gather ammunition.

BEAT DAUGHTER TILL WITH FEVER

Warrant Out for William Farmer, of Manchester—Girl May Not Recover.

A warrant is out for the arrest of William Farmer, a white man, of Manchester, who is wanted on the charge of having cruelly beaten his step-daughter, Ollie Gammon, fifteen years of age, who at the time was ill with typhoid fever, and who is now in a critical condition.
