BALTIMORE HAS BAD SUNDAY FIRE

Damage of \$400,000 Is Done to Buildings and Their Contents.

BALTIMORE, MD., October 17.—Fire to-day starting in the largest six-story double building at the southeast corner of Baltimore and Patuxent streets, destroyed property valued at \$400,000.

By the falling of a large section of one of the walls upon an adjoining building, six firemen were slightly hurt, and four others, at various points, suffered minor injuries.

The fire appears to have started from some undiscovered cause, in the sixth floor of the structure which belongs to Charles W. Abell and Mrs. E. T. Homer. This portion of the building was occupied by J. Schoeneman, manufacturer of pantaloons. On the lower floor was the establishment of Goldenberg Bros., manufacturers of cloaks. The entire eastern half of the building occurred in the hands of Frank & Alder, dealers in shoes.

The flames were confined to this building, but damage was done by water and smoke in several others further from the corner.

What the fire was hottest there was an explosion, supposed to have been an accumulation of gas from broken pipes, and almost the whole of the eastern wall of the Friedenwald building about the fifth floor crashed down and fell into the street, striking the structure was occupied by Reinhart, Meyer & Co., wholesale clothiers, and the Monumental Custom Tailors.

Water and smoke was suffered also by S. Halle & Sons, shoes and finders, 325 West Baltimore Street; N. B. Lobe, auctioneers, 323 West Baltimore Street; and the removal company, 323 Germania Street, and others.

Will Not Resign. Colonel Blackburn Denies Intention to Quit His Post.

NEW YORK, October 17.—Colonel J. C. S. Blackburn, of Kentucky, head of the Department of Civil Administration in the Panama Canal zone, arrived here to-night from Cristobal. Colonel Blackburn denied that he contemplated resigning as Governor of the canal zone.

He said that he and Colonel Goethals would go to Washington for a week, and then to their homes in Versailles, Ky.

Steamer Is Floated. MIAMI, Fla., October 17.—The British steamer Cameron, bound from Philadelphia to Tampa, coal laden, which ran on a reef near the harbor entrance here Friday of last week, was floated this afternoon after 500 tons of her cargo had been jettisoned. She was unharmed.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., October 17.—Judge James W. Bowers, dean of the law school of the University of North Carolina, and one of the most prominent of the State's older generation of jurists and statesmen, died suddenly at 11 o'clock of heart failure at his home at Chapel Hill to-night.

He served the State virtuously as Senator, Superior Court judge and associate justice of the Supreme Court, and had been at the head of the State bar since 1899. He was seventy-one years old.

Seeking Revenge for Ferrer's Death. TWELVE HUNDRED VETERANS COMING FOR FERRER'S DEATH.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., October 17.—Attempts to hold a monster memorial meeting to protest against the recent execution at Barcelona, Spain, of Dr. Ferrer, were frustrated in this city to-night by the police, who refused to allow a large hall near the center of the city to be opened, although those in charge of the proposed meeting had paid the rent in advance and held a lease for the property.

Balked in their attempt to use the hall, the speakers and many of their followers adjourned to the National Library. Here they started to get the meeting under way when the police again interfered and compelled them to leave the building.

During the afternoon a meeting was held in a hall in the Italian section of the city. About 500 people filled the hall, and heard addresses.

Five Killed by Bomb. LISBON, October 17.—Cable dispatches from Barcelona state that the situation there is increasingly disquieting. Twenty-seven bombs have been thrown in the last four days, five persons being killed and twenty-one wounded.

Victoria Campaign. ROME, October 17.—All indications point to the fact that the extremists in Italy are determined to undertake an anti-Clerical campaign, more vigorous even than that in France. This is being directed by the Free Masons, whose grand master has issued a most violent manifesto in behalf of Ferrer and against the church.

An international subscription has been opened for the purpose of collecting funds to establish the Piazza of St. Peter's, facing the Vatican, Ferrer's modern school, which was suppressed in Barcelona.

Many Meetings of Protest. PARIS, October 17.—The anti-Spanish demonstration culminated to-day in meetings and processions in the larger cities of France, organized by the socialists and workmen's organizations. The organizers laid emphasis on the peaceful character of these demonstrations, and although violent speeches were made, little disorder is reported.

In Paris the government has taken elaborate precautions to prevent the recurrence of rioting.

Disorder in Havana. HAVANA, October 17.—A disorderly mob of several thousands made a demonstration this afternoon in honor of the late General Ferrer.

Violent orations were given by General Enrique Loynaz Del Castillo, who recently was appointed envoy extraordinary to the United States, and other dignitaries, and resolutions were passed to boycott all Spanish goods.

The demonstrators in Havana refused to unload Spanish ships until Spain rescinds the order prohibiting Ferrer's estate. Many arrests followed in the office of the Diaro De La Marina.

Predicts Revolution. PARIS, October 17.—Alejandro Barceolob, chief of the Republicans at Lerocomb, in an interview here to-day, predicted a revolution in Spain and the establishment of a republic.

Supreme Council of Scottish Rite Will Meet in Washington. WASHINGTON, D. C., October 17.—What promises to prove one of the most important meetings of the history of the Supreme Council of the Scottish Rite, the fact of the university of the Southern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite, will be held here to-day.

The grand commanders of all three of the supreme councils in this part of the world, The are J. W. Richardson, of Tennessee, of the Southern; General Samuel C. Lawrence, of the Northern; and Dr. E. Gibson, of the Canadian Jurisdiction.

The forthcoming meeting will be devoted to the consideration of business which has accumulated during the past two years, and the perfection of plans for the ensuing two years.
