BANKER IS ARRESTED. Charged With Accepting Deposits for Insolvent Institution. NASHVILLE, TENN., October 24.—Morgan P. Estes, vice-president of the City Savings Bank, which failed to open its doors last Saturday morning, has been arrested. The arrest was made on a warrant charging that Estes had accepted a deposit after he knew the bank was insolvent. T. Otley, of Burkesville, Ky., is prosecutor. He sets forth in his affidavit that on September 11 he deposited \$1,150 in the City Savings Bank, charging that at that time Estes knew the bank was insolvent, and that in accepting the deposit he violated a section of the Tennessee law making such action a felony.

Estes was arraigned before a magistrate, who held him to the grand jury in \$5,000 bond, which was promptly furnished.

HAVE WRONG IDEA ABOUT JAPANESE

(Continued from Page One—Column 7.)

Which the average traveler never meets, numbering about 50,000,000. "Japan Is Our Equal."

"The idea that the Japanese, because they are yellow, are inferior to us is false," he said. "Japan is our equal in every way; its people are not lower than us because they are yellow. They have a different development, and in that way differ from us."

He outlined the various religions which the Japanese have adopted in their search for the truth, and said that Buddhism, which is the religion of the people, is in its decadence, for Buddhism in its early purity does not now exist. He related how the priests have practiced all sorts of gross immoralities. He said that Japan is ready for Christianity, if it is administered in the right way. "Things are not little in Japan," he said earnestly. "The Japanese have high moralities, high thoughts, high ideals and high aspirations, and the young men are looking for something better and higher than Buddhism affords them, but they are hard to convince, having already tried three different religions and found them worthless."

Then Dr. Teusler exploited the need for more missionaries and told of how he had labored to find some young physician who would be willing to go to Japan with him to his associates, but he exclaimed: "Americans are given over to materialism, they look towards the dollar as the one achievement to be attained, and all I have seen have asked me 'What is I make here?'"

He told them of his visit to his adopted life—but it had been of little avail. "I would rather stay in my present work," he exclaimed, "than come back to Richmond for a practice of \$1,000 a year, and at that the audience cheered as one man."

I believe that the reason I have been turned down in my search is because the young men haven't vision; they haven't horizon, environment enough; they lack education.
