W. R. Caffee, guard on the University of Virginia football team, whose duty it is to participate in the Navy game last Saturday has been challenged, last night made a complete statement of his position. He said: "When the university football team came through Richmond after the game in Norfolk with Lehigh, I went to the hotel where the players were stopping, and there talked with several of them and with some members of the faculty, and while doing so I suggested that the honor system be turned to the university and enter the academic department, intending to take up medicine again later on. I went to the university with the team, and in company with several friends, the preceding night, I went to the university and investigated the situation to see whether I could follow this plan. "I found that I could do so, and accordingly matriculated as a regular academic student, and as my work in the preceding year was satisfactory, I had not been entirely satisfactory to the faculty. I was put on the pledge of diligence customary in similar cases. "My intention in returning was to pursue an academic education, post-graduate in medicine, and to do some work, and, of course, I wanted to play on the team again if I could do so. To play football, however, was not the primary object of my return, and no inducement was offered me for my re-entrance into the team. I was not allowed to play on the team. Work of Coaches Shows in Steady Improvement in All Departments--Izard May Not Be Able to Play. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) LEXINGTON, VA., October 28.—The coaches have for the past two days been making every effort to whip the Washington and Lee eleven into winning form for the Lynchburg Fair Grounds Saturday, and they have been very successful, since the team is now working much more smoothly, and the defensive work is steadily improving. The men play together in great style, the plays go off well, and the ends show far better form than last week. Coach Pfeiffer has both Smart and Simms playing much surer football than Washington and Lee's ends have so far done. He is devoting a great deal of attention to tackling in order to remedy the defects in this line shown in the Davidson game. Pfeiffer is pleased with the team's improvement, and is working steadily to make the backs going fast and hard, and the interference is also getting better. Coach Blighman expects to put the strongest line hard and their playing against the Techs should be even better than it was in last Saturday's game. Captain Izard has been on the field every afternoon, but has been unable to practice on account of a bad shoulder and sprained wrist. It is his intention to get in the V. P. I. game, however, though Pfeiffer has both Wilson and Ordeman working in his quarters on the field, and Izard has recovered from his injuries and is playing left half. He is a fast man and is a reliable ground gainer. White, who played left end in the latter part of the Davidson game, is now being used in the backfield. He is perhaps the fastest man on the field, and has the making of a strong half back in him. White's speed and 180 pounds of bone and muscle make him a hard man to stop. Barwood also is playing good football, and Barwood has recovered sufficiently to practice during the past two days. Johnson is a little lame from the Davidson game, but he will undoubtedly be in good shape by Saturday. The men in the line are in excellent condition. They have been kept in the

best of physical trim the entire season, thanks to Coach Pfeiffer's hard work, and now show the value of the training he has given them. Not a man has been injured enough to keep out of single day's scrimmage, and Washington and Lee have been playing faster than formerly. The right side is heavier than the left, and Osborn and Ozzin are being used more extensively than O'Quinn and Bruce, who are at left tackle and left guard, respectively. Osborn is faster than O'Quinn, and Morris, with his 188 pounds, at right guard, is a valuable man. He played on the varsity in '07 and '08, and he has steadily improved since his first season, when he played good football against V. P. I., Virginia and Bucknell. Bruce continues his good work, and these two, with Blackburn, will make a strong center for the White and Blue line. O'Quinn has been doing the punting, but White has shown good form this week, and he will probably play in the game against Captain Hodgson, of the Techs. Although Captain Izard will be handicapped by his recent injuries, the coaches expect to put the strongest team against V. P. I. that Washington and Lee has ever sent out. The men have been all quartered together in the comfortable quarters of the Executive House, which the members of the chapter have given up for the team's accommodation this week. It is Mr. Pfeiffer's idea to keep the men together as much as possible. But while the practice was successful, it was apparent that the coaches have put into effect an ironclad rule that as soon as a player fumbles he must retire for several days in the game with Colgate on Saturday, and to-day it was two lost quarterbacks their positions. The first of the two yesterday successfully conducted the scrub team. He fumbled the ball shortly after the action started and was immediately called out of the game.
