TENTH DISTRICT LEADERS ACTIVE

Colonel James Will Lose Few Votes by Improper Marking of Ballots.

SATISFIED WITH CHOICE

Nomination of Committee to Fill Vacancy on Ticket Pleasing to Voters.



LOVINGSTON, VA., October 30.—Notwithstanding the complications that have arisen in the final stages of the campaign with reference to marking the ticket for the office of Secretary of the Commonwealth, the Democrats in this section of the State are apparently well prepared for the battle of the ballots next Tuesday, and present indications are that the activity of the leaders will result in pulling Colonel B. O. James almost up with the other Democratic nominees on the ticket.

James Has Nothing to Fear.
Of course, the Richmond candidate will lose some Democratic votes through inadvertence and improper marking, but the final discrepancy between him and his running mates in Amherst, Nelson and other counties in this immediate section will be trifling in all probability, for what at first appeared to be a very perplexing situation has been greatly simplified by the action of the State leaders at Richmond, together with the alertness of the local party authorities.

The Democratic voters in these counties have nearly all received full instructions from State headquarters in Richmond as to how to mark their tickets, and each local chairman has been provided with a sufficient number of rubber stamps containing the name of Colonel James to supply all the precincts in his county. But the chairman will not rest at this. They are arranging to have at least one intelligent, active Democratic worker at each precinct, who will remain during the entire day, to give the voters such information as will insure the proper marking of the tickets. There may be some precincts where the services of such men will not be available, but as a rule this scheme will be faithfully carried out.

Therefore, it is predicted that Colonel James will come out of this section with a lead over his Republican opponent, which will serve him well in

Tucker Men in Line.
The Republican talk about Tucker Democrats scratching Judge Mann and those who may be dissatisfied concerning the appointment of division school superintendents voting against J. D. Eggleston, Jr., will not pan out here in the mountains, for the Tucker people are working well in harness with the Mann friends, and the voters up here have no grievance growing out of the appointment of superintendents. As a rule, those interested in school matters get about what they wanted in this section, and the only Democratic scratches, D. Eggleston will get next Tuesday will result from mistakes on the part of voters in erasing his name, instead of that of the late lamented Secretary of the Commonwealth. Mr. Eggleston will lose nothing in Nelson by reason of the fact that his Republican competitor, Captain Frank P. Brent, is a native of this county. A number of the latter's near relatives, who have been lifelong Democrats, have indicated their purpose to stand by their first love, although they have a kinsman running in opposition to the nominee of their party.

Indications point to a comparatively tight vote by both parties in Amherst and Nelson, though this will not materially affect general results, for the Republicans are showing much less activity than the Democrats. Judge Mann will come out of the two counties with a comfortable majority of approximately 1,200, and his running mate, including Colonel James, will not be far behind him.

Has Given Satisfaction.
The nomination of Colonel James by the State Central Committee to fill the place left vacant on the ticket by the sudden death of Secretary Eggleston has given general satisfaction in this portion of the State, though he is not widely known except among the party leaders. The fact that he is put down as a conservative and that he trained with the minority wing of the party in the recent State primary at once emphasized the fairness of the committee in dealing with a delicate situation, which is expected to yield good results next Tuesday.

Irving P. Whitehead, the member of the committee from Amherst, supported Chief Clerk Hankins, and his nomination would likewise have given eminent satisfaction, owing to the fact that he has rendered such faithful and valuable service in the office for the past twenty years. The graceful behavior of Mr. Hankins, Colonel Sale and others who at one time or another were in the race is contributing much to the strength of the new nominee, and, as has been heretofore pointed out, it is the opinion of well posted politicians that he will lose practically no Democratic votes except such as may be lost as a result of the improper marking of tickets by those who intend to vote for him.

Although the present campaign has been devoid of excitement, still the voters in the country will be glad when the election is over, so that they may enjoy at least a brief season of rest from the turmoil and confusion incident to political contests. Next year Congressmen will have to be elected, and the voters know that their escape from the blemishments of office-seekers will be only temporary at best. It is intimated in certain quarters that some fierce congressional contests are already brewing, and that shortly after the State election is out of the way they will be brought sharply into public notice.

INTEREST IN BUDGET

It May Produce Very Bad Effect in Cuba's Affairs.

HAVANA, October 29.—A meeting of the National Committee of Conservatives was held for the purpose of deciding, preparatory to the opening of Congress November 1, what the future course of the party shall be. All the speakers agreed that the administration of President Gomez was a failure, and that it was the duty of the Conservatives to abandon the policy of sustaining the government, which hitherto they had followed for the purpose of giving it a fair trial, and to begin an active anti-administrative campaign in Congress and the press. A resolution to this was unanimously adopted.

It is rumored that President Gomez probably will attempt to placate the Conservatives by offering them positions in the Cabinet, in which already there are two vacancies, and from which there is a strong probability that Secretary of the Treasury Villegas soon will retire.

Intense interest attaches to the budget which President Gomez will submit to Congress. It is rumored that it will carry an amount considerably in excess of the current budget, and it is thought probable that it will produce a very bad effect.
