

ELIOT CONCLUDES LECTURE SERIES

Speaks on Collectivism and Individualism in Our Government.

CHANGES ARE FOR BETTER

Growth of Collectivism Regarded as Inevitable and Beneficial by Speaker.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., November 12.—Dr. Charles W. Eliot, president emeritus of Harvard University, tonight concluded his series of lectures on "Individualism and Collectivism in a Democracy."

He traced the decline of individualism in municipal government from the time, some sixty years ago, when the water supply was drawn from wells and street illumination was accomplished with whale-oil lamps.

He pointed out the extreme newness of all the present municipal conditions. The utilities of the modern municipality, the results of collectivism, have been the cause of a revolution which has already gone far beyond the opportunity and the source of corruption.
