

Now about this Waterways Association. I have heard gentlemen—I think I heard our distinguished Speaker intimate that he did not see what was the necessity of a waterway when it was only a biscuit throw over into the ocean, but that is because he comes from Illinois.

Mr. Taft declared for improvement of the waterways, stating that it was a matter of national importance and that the government should take action to improve them.

Notable Reception. The reception held by the President prior to his review of the parade and address was a most notable affair, among the several hundred people who met and shook his hand being Virginia's most honored sons, distinguished statesmen, business men and others from many of the Atlantic seaboard States now attending the waterways convention.

The conclusion of the President's official reception marked the beginning of the parade, a naval, military and civic affair, which was never before witnessed in the city of Norfolk.

As the President proceeded from his hotel through Granby and Main Streets to the reviewing stand, a grand stand erected immediately in front of the Norfolk Hotel, the President was greeted by a large number of people.

Seventy members of the press from Washington arrived early to-day, being met by Chairman Alvah H. Martin, of the general press committee, and others.

Did Himself Proud. This was the first time that a President of the United States had ever been the official guest of the municipality, the President's reception at Norfolk was a most notable affair.

It was just as the sun began to shine, lifting a light fog through which the Mayflower had proceeded from Hampton Roads to Norfolk, that the President's yacht dropped anchor on the naval anchorage of Hospital Point.

President Taft came ashore from the Mayflower on the naval tug Mohawk, upon which he was met by Rear Admiral E. D. Taussig, commanding this naval station, and the joint reception committee from the city of Norfolk and the Waterways Convention.
