BISHOP CRITICIZES DAILY NEWSPAPERS

Leading Divine Says World Is Searched for Evil to Feature.

GREAT MEETING FOR LAYMEN

Prominent Church Members Pledge Their Efforts for Missions.

RALEIGH, N. C., November 25.—Bishop A. W. Wilson, senior Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, presiding over the North Carolina Conference here, declared at a Thanksgiving Day sermon to-day that there are too many daily newspapers featuring evil, that the world is searched from day to day for all that is bad, and this is dishied up for perusal at the breakfast table.

The business session of the North Carolina Methodist Conference was held from 9:30 to 11 o'clock, at which hour Bishop Wilson delivered his powerful Thanksgiving sermon.

He is survived by his widow and eight children, and a large family connection.

Freight Wreck on Southern. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) SPENCER, N. C., November 25.—A north-bound freight train was wrecked on the main line of the Southern Railway at China this afternoon. Two cars were demolished, and the track was badly blocked, causing a delay of passenger trains. The train crew escaped without injury.

Developing Soapstone Quarry. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) FREDERICKSBURG, Va., November 25.—A large force of men is engaged in developing a soapstone quarry near Verdigreville, Va. MEETS INSTANT DEATH. Bridge Employs Falls 114 Feet from Pier to Rocks Below. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) WOODSTOCK, Va., November 25.—W. W. Gard, an employee of the American Bridge Company, who was working on the bridge over the South River at Willow Grove, two miles south of here, fell from a pier to the creek, 114 feet below, and was killed instantly to-day.

RIVAL DOCTOR GOT SERMON. Saved Life of Patient While Boy It Was Intended For Died. McALESTER, Okla., November 25.—A remarkable case of a scientific standpoint has developed in a small town near McAlester and will probably be fought out in the criminal courts. It involves the treatment of a supply of antitoxin ordered by one doctor for his own child, by another physician, who was treating a desperate case of diphtheria. The father case recovered under the antitoxin, but the child of the physicians, for whom the antitoxin had been ordered, died. The physician, whose child died, telephoned a McAlester physician to rush him a supply of antitoxin. This friend obtained the serum and engaged a boy at a livery stable to drive as fast as possible the twenty-five miles with it to the neighboring town. The boy arrived at 1 o'clock in the morning. He stopped at the first house displaying a light and had his point out the house where he delivered the serum. It was the home of a rival doctor, who was also treating a case of diphtheria. He saved his patient.
