

WARSHIPS FOR FRANCE

Plans Adopted for Building of Dreadnoughts. (Special Cable to The Times-Dispatch.) PARIS, November 27.—The new naval program to be submitted to the Chamber of Deputies in January proposes two Dreadnoughts, to be laid down at Brest and L'Orient during 1910; two more in 1911, and two in 1912. The disposition of turrets of these vessels will differ from either the American or British types. Each turret will contain two 205-millimeter guns. Four turrets will be placed along the longitudinal axis of the ship, two on each side. The first and sixth turrets will be placed amidships, one on each side. They will be of the same diameter and on the same level, thus limiting the fire to elevations to their own sides. The secondary battery will consist of eighteen pieces of 138 millimetres. The vessels will have a speed of twenty knots. Special efforts will be made to avoid delay in construction. It is not hoped to complete the rate of twenty-four months for building a 20,000-ton ship, or Germany's thirty months, but every effort possible will be done to not only make a speed of twenty knots, but a building rate is observed France counts on having by 1915 nineteen armor class, of which twelve will be Dreadnoughts. The cost of the new vessels is now estimated at 74,000,000 francs each. This includes the cost of the artillery, as is always done in estimating the cost of warships in France.

PEACE IMPOSSIBLE

The Temps Declares Another Spirit Must Rule Vatican. (Special Cable to The Times-Dispatch.) PARIS, November 27.—The Temps considers the discussion of the church question in the Chamber of Deputies as a great mistake. This is evident from a speech in reply to a speech of Abbe Gayraud, of great importance, since it again emphasizes how, in spite of the refusal to recognize the separation law, and continues to repulse all efforts at conciliation which have been proposed, and even goes so far as to make a new spirit, the paper declares, must rule the Vatican before a settlement is possible. This is evidenced by the refusal of the Vatican to aid in the settlement of the church question in France, whereas it stops at nothing to hinder the settlement of the governments of other countries. The Temps points out that under the rule of intelligence of Leo XIII, the situation would be treated with liberality and common sense, and concludes with the assertion that religious peace will be possible only if the restrictions its energy to religion and the French clergy follow the dictates of conscience instead of orders from Rome.

LONG TRIP TO REACH HOME

Michael Walsh Not Yet Finished Journey to Ireland. BOSTON, MASS., November 27.—To reach his home in Ireland, Michael Walsh, of Rochester, N. Y., has traveled from Rochester to Montreal, Liverpool and Boston, but has not yet ended his journey. When he arrived in Boston to-day, in the steamer of the liner Saxonia, from Liverpool, he was held by the immigration authorities until the status of his citizenship could be settled. Walsh said that he crossed the ocean from Montreal on the steamship Laurentian. When the steamer reached Queenstown Walsh was asleep, and when he awoke the vessel was on her way to Liverpool. He took passage on the Saxonia for Queenstown, but again he was carried by, this time being too sick to wish to be carried. He can satisfy the authorities that he is an American citizen, Walsh will sail on the first steamer for Queenstown, but he will be deported, securing free passage to Ireland.

Many Americans Attend. (Special Cable to The Times-Dispatch.) BERLIN, November 27.—It is expected that the attendance at the exhibition at the Passion Play at Oberammergau next summer will be a record one, their number being estimated at from 20,000 to 40,000. About 10,000 beds will be placed at the disposal of strangers. Each bed will be numbered to correspond with the numbers on the seats for the performances. The prices range from \$4.50 to \$8 per day for bed, board and performance. Parties of Americans in Berlin are already forming to attend the play.

RACE WORLD INDIGNANT

Alleged Racers Are Arrested and Thrown Into Jail. (Special Cable to The Times-Dispatch.) PARIS, November 27.—The French laws forbidding any betting on race-courses except by the Pari-Mutuel system, are extremely strict. It is even illegal for one person to stake money on behalf of another at the betting booth. The special brigades of police, who attend the meetings to watch for infringements of the regulations, arrested this week three well-known frequenters of race meetings, one of whom is himself a horse-owner who acts as betting agent for Gaston Dreyfuss, the banker, and one of France's leading race-horse owners. The three men were kept in confinement for twenty-six hours, while the police searched their houses for proofs of illicit

betting. They were then released. The action of the police, which was taken on blank warrants, has aroused the greatest indignation in the racing world.

MAY MODIFY COURTS

Committee Declares Against Examination by Judge. (Special Cable to The Times-Dispatch.) PARIS, November 27.—The committee appointed to study a modification of criminal procedure in France, of which M. Barthou, the Minister of Justice, is the chairman, met this morning. The question of procedure at the Assize Courts was first taken up. It was agreed unanimously that the examination of an accused person by the presiding judge in cases like that of Madame Steinhilf should be suppressed. A strong majority of the committee maintained that the present system in regard to the exposition of the act of accusation as drawn up by the Public Prosecutor should be upheld, but its character should be changed so as to become purely objective and completely impartial. At the present time this act of accusation assumes that the accused person is guilty.

Marchioness Asks Too Much. (Special Cable to The Times-Dispatch.) ROME, November 27.—The negotiations between the United States and the Marchioness di Rudini for the sale of a house for the American embassy have failed, owing to the high price asked by the marchioness, who, it is stated, demands \$1,250,000 for the property.

The papal gendarmes threaten to strike in case of a sum of money recently given to the Pope for a distribu-

tion among the members of the corps being divided by the officers, then getting nothing, the latter formulated a protest which concludes as follows: "We have asked and begged more than 1,000 times for an increase in pay, but to no avail. Cardinal Del Val hates us to death. All his affection is bestowed on the Swiss Halberdiers."

Will Sell Crown Jewels. (Special Cable to The Times-Dispatch.) PARIS, November 27.—The Mont de Piete, as France's state monopoly for pawnbroking is entitled, announced this morning by large white advertisements, while being reserved here for official notices, the sale of a rich collection of jewels, beginning on December 8 and lasting a week. These, although the advertisement does not state the fact, are some of the crown jewels of Abdi Aziz, ex-Sultan of Morocco, who pawned them for 1,000,000 francs two years ago. As the interest on the money advanced has not been paid, they will be sold in auction. The collection contains hundreds of pearls and twenty watches, the whole weighing 450 pounds.

To Rebuild Messina. (Special Cable to The Times-Dispatch.) ROME, November 27.—The deputations representing the province of Messina assembled to-day and discussed urgent measures to hasten the permanent reconstruction of the city of Messina, which is imperative since the survivors of the earthquake. The city is overcrowded and is rapidly becoming uninhabitable, owing to the fact that the unseasoned wood used in the construction is rotting. The deputations decided to urge the government to push forward the work of reconstruction and to assist in the revival of the local trade.
