Political offenders, real and suspected, crowd the jails. The government's allowance for the food of these prisoners is absurdly small, and as a result many of them are half starved.

Threat for Costa Rica. SAN JUAN DEL SUR, NICARAGUA, December 13.—In view of the constant attacks made by revolutionists from the Costa Rican frontier, in the latest of which six of the government troops were killed, the administration at Managua has again asked the Costa Rican government to place its troops along the border.

Ready for Start. NEW YORK, December 13.—All was hustle and bustle in the marine barracks at the navy yard here to-day in preparing 113 marines ordered out from the yard for their start to-morrow for Philadelphia, presumably to board the transport Praire, which will leave the League Island navy yards and sail for Nicaragua.

Several Companies Leave. BOSTON, MASS., December 13.—Several small companies of marines started from the Charleston and Portsmouth navy yards and from the training station at Newport to-day to join the large body which will sail from Philadelphia for Central America on the Praire.

It is alleged that Wright shipped his tobacco to be sold independently of the pool, and if such a proceeding were allowed Wright would be at a great and unfair advantage over those others who went into the pool. The Burley Society asks that Wright, a small grower, be required to abide by the terms of his pledge. Judge Kirby granted a temporary restraining order returnable Monday of next week.
