

WORLD'S SERIES MAY NOT BE PLAYED

Big Leagues Have Different Length Schedules of Games.

NEW YORK, December 21.—Will there be a world's championship baseball series next fall? Persons familiar with the inside machinery of the game were prone to the belief yesterday that unless the two major leagues changed their plans the public will be deprived of a test between the rival pennant winners.

HOOKER TRADED FOR FIELDER KING

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] LYNCHBURG, Va., December 21.—President McLaughlin, of the Lynchburg Baseball Association, announced today that "Buck" Hooker, who played center field three years for the Shoemakers, has just been traded to Danville for King, the fleet right fielder, last season with Danville and 1918 with Roanoke.

Hooker asked a short time ago for his release, wanting to get away from Lynchburg, and King, who is a resident of Philadelphia and a personal friend of Manager Smith, asked some time ago to be taken on by this team if his release could be bought.

"As Brooklyn stands practically no chance of winning the pennant next year, Ebbets had nothing to lose when he advocated the 138-game schedule, and was readily supported by Murphy, who probably feels that the Cubs will have a hard time beating the champion Pirates out in future.

"The present state of affairs, therefore, can be attributed to the general desire for gate receipts, for out of the sixteen major league clubs not more than four or five have chances to take part in the world's series of 1910. If the magnates really cared for the comfort of players and fans they would adopt 110-game schedules, which would open the championship races about May 1. But they are not brainless.

It is believed to be a sure thing that the American League will not recede from its present position, and it is also a certainty that the team winning the American League pennant would decline to take part in a world's series after remaining idle six or seven days while the National League champions were finishing their part of the schedule.

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
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MAN WHO GIVES \$500,000 TO FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS

OUTLINE PLAN FOR WORK ON RIVER

Committee to Divide Duties Which Fall to Government and City.

Members of the James River Improvement Committee and delegates from other organizations who represented the city at the recent convention of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress in Washington met at the Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon for the first discussion of proposed improvements on the river.

Colonel Samuel L. Yonge, assistant United States engineer at Richmond, was present and addressed the meeting on the subject. Colonel Yonge has been over the ground thoroughly, and was one of the corps making recommendations to Congress. From an engineering viewpoint he is thoroughly familiar with the needs.

Mr. Crenshaw read the draft of a report to be made by the various delegates to the bodies which they represented at Washington. The work of the conference was divided into two parts, one relating to work to be done by the city, and the other to that of the government. Chairman Crenshaw will appoint a committee on organization and procedure, consisting of nine men, this to be subdivided into subcommittees of three each. They will report the result of various investigations assigned to them at a called meeting of the conference to be held as soon as practicable.
