Note in Convention for Petersburg Man Is Unanimous.

WILL MEET IN DANVILLE

Convention Adjourns After Two Days' Session—Officers Chosen and Delegates Named.

Staunton, Va., May 14.—The Virginia Division of the Travelers' Protective Association brought its two days' annual convention to a close at 2:30 this afternoon, the last day being a continuous session, and the latter part of it a very live one.

Danville was chosen without serious opposition as the next place of meeting.

Considerable routine business of minor importance was transacted in the earlier part of the day, and H. L. Harwood, the secretary, was presented with a massive silver loving cup and had his salary raised from \$1,300 to \$2,000.

Election of President. When it came to the election of the general officers there was some pretty warm talk, and the feeling for a while was very tense, but everything opened out smoothly and harmoniously in the end. Robert W. Price, of Petersburg, was nominated for president, whereupon W. K. Bache, of Richmond, spoke at length, saying that very unjust insinuations and innuendoes had been directed against Richmond's candidate, Robert W. Price, of Petersburg, and defended. He was followed by W. T. Dabney, who spoke along the same line. Clowes was not put in nomination and Price was unanimously elected, having been seconded by Colonel John S. Adams, of Richmond. The other officers were enlorged Clowes, and everything became serene.

TO SAVE THE SEALS 500 Males Will Be Allowed to Escape From Killing Fields. Washington, May 14.—Fifty hundred three-year-old male seals are to be allowed to escape from the killing fields on the Pribilof Islands, so as to supply the required number of breeding adults in the future. They are to be marked in such a manner as to make them readily recognizable throughout the season, and under any circumstances are they to be slain. They are to be of the best examples of the seal herd. The yearling pups to be taken having skins weighing less than five pounds nor more than eight and a half pounds. The work is to be completed by May 15, while the number to be put to death for food for the natives on the islands for the year beginning July 1, must not exceed 2,300.

The agents of the government will have charge of the welfare of the natives to whom the sale of intoxicants is prohibited. The privilege of taking the seals, heretofore leased to a private company, now rests with the government, which is to sell the skins to the highest bidder. Hope is expressed that before the season is over an international agreement may be reached to prevent pelagic sealing.

First Opera in Irish. (Special Cable to The Times-Dispatch.) Dublin, May 14.—A patriotic opera performed in the Irish tongue will be produced at the Gaiety Theatre during this month. Composed by Robert O'Dwyer, with Irish lyrics, the work was completed just before the artist's death, and he was notified that his signature did not appear upon the canvas. The portrait was carried to the artist on his deathbed to make good the omission, and the painting in his name was the last picture he ever painted. William Orchardson was destined to accompany the opera.
