YALE AND HARVARD WILL MEET AGAIN

Cambridge, Mass., June 23.—Harvard's strength and Yale's weakness in the pitcher's box gave the Crimson the second game of the baseball series to-day, by the score of 3 to 2, and sends the deciding contest to New York for next Tuesday. The Blue batters made very little progress to-day in solving Hicks' curves, while Murfey lasted but two innings, during which three Harvard men raced across the plate. Then Tommers went in and stopped further Crimson tallies.

This gave the field a particularly rosy hue until the seventh, when Harvard made a couple of errors, which, with some schoolboy plays, and a short hit, gave Yale two runs. Hicks, however, prevented further tallies. Ten thousand enthusiasts enjoyed the sport. Score:

Dr. Day was riding up Main Street when Watkins ran into his horse with an automobile, throwing Dr. Day to the pavement, but he was not injured. Evidence showed that the accident was due to negligence.

KOHLER ACQUITTED "Golden Rule" Chief of Cleveland Will Be Reinstated. Cleveland, O., June 23.—Frederick Kohler, the "golden rule" chief of police, who was suspended from his position by Mayor Baer upon the charge of alleged drunkenness and immorality, was acquitted by the Civil Service Commission to-day. The decision followed a lengthy trial. Kohler will be reinstated at once.

POPULATION IS 331,069 Washington Shows Increase of 18.8 Per Cent. in Ten Years. Washington, D. C., June 23.—The population of the District of Columbia is 331,069, in the last decade, according to the returns of the thirteenth census, made public this afternoon, this is an increase of 52,351 over the population of the District in 1900, which was 278,718. The population in 1890 was 239,392. The increase from 1900 to 1910, therefore, was 52.3 per cent, compared with the increase of 45.35, or 21 per cent, for the preceding decade.

TWO RAILWAYS BLOCKED Bridge on Pennsylvania Road Crossing Over Reading Tracks Falls. Reading, Pa., June 23.—The collapse of a bridge on the Schuylkill Valley division of the Pennsylvania Railroad early to-day has completely blocked traffic on that division of the road, and on the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad at Auburn, near Pottsville. Telegraphic communication along the line of the Reading Road is also interrupted. No one was hurt.

Found His Colt Dead. W. L. Alley, who keeps a blacksmith shop, was surprised yesterday morning when he went to his stable to find a valuable colt dead. No reason could be assigned for the death of the horse, which Mr. Alley prized very highly.

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
