LARGE CROWD HEARS TEMPERANCE ADDRESS

Local Option Campaign in Progress in Fredericksburg—Old Soldier Seriously Injured.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Fredericksburg, Va., August 29.—Rev. J. D. McAllister, secretary of the Virginia Anti-Saloon League, addressed a large crowd on the subject of temperance in the Hurkamp Park here yesterday afternoon.

There is some cotton already open in the Piedmont section, which thought that there will be a new bale sold from that township some time next week.

The earliest bale of new crop cotton ever sold in the State was sold at Wadesboro, August 5, 1857, by W. L. Little, of the State Institute, E. R. Tomlinson, who was then farmer near Wadesboro, also had a bale out that year on August 5. In August, 1897, there were at least 1,900 bales of new crop cotton sold in Anson, 500 bales of this amount being weighed at the platform here.

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
