Philadelphia, Pa., September 2.—Philadelphia defeated New York in two games to-day by 3 to 2 and 5 to 4. [Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Petersburg, Va., September 2.—This afternoon's game between Lynchburg and Petersburg was one of the snappiest games witnessed in this city this season, being remarkable for the scarcity of base hits and the rapidly with which the batsmen were retired. The game lasted for ten innings, and was a pitched battle between Hamilton and Sexton. Hamilton allowed thirty men to face him in the ten innings, gave only one base hit, struck out five men and was hit safely three times. Sexton was only hit once, by a pitcher's bat, and struck out five men. Lynchburg only got one runner as far as second base, while Petersburg got two as far as the third sack. Edwards, a new man, was behind the bat for Petersburg, and he made good, his throwing to bases being very accurate. Westervelt called the game at the end of the tenth inning, as the cloudiness of the weather made it difficult for the batsmen and players to see the ball plainly.
