RICHMOND COLLEGE WINS HARD BATTLE

Defeats Randolph-Macon by Taking Brace in Last Quarter After Series of Difficult Plays. Block Effort to Kick Goal.

When it seemed certain that the game would result in a no-score tie, with Randolph-Macon having a shade the better of it in the playing, Richmond College, at Broad Street Park yesterday afternoon, took a brace in the last quarter, and after a series of speedy plays, in which Saddle, Taylor and Lutz did the best of the ground gaining, put Quarterback Jones over the goal for a touchdown. The kick for goal was blocked and the score was 5 to 0 when the whistle blew a few minutes later.

Keen Interest Shown. The spectators were so close to the game they showed more real football than at any other time. Though replete with fumbles, misplays and the consequent penalties, the game was most interesting, from the spectator's viewpoint especially. The weather was cool and snappy enough to make men feel like playing football, but not enough like fall for the average man to wish for an overcoat.

For the time of week the crowd was better than generally turns out at an exhibition college game, and enthusiasm ran high as the old time enemies of the gridiron struggled back and forth between the goals. The tactics of the teams were entirely different except as to kicking, which both sides resorted to many times.



ST. LOUIS LAID DOWN TO LET LAJOIE WIN

Serious Charge by Sporting Writers Against Big League Team—Players Deny Accusation. Matter May Be Investigated.

St. Louis, Mo., October 10.—Sporting writers here charge that the local team of the American League yesterday allowed the Cleveland Indians to obtain hits. The object of this, it is charged, was to enable him to score more runs during the season than were credited to Cobb of Detroit. The first time he hit a long liner to center field that netted him a three-run hit. Six other times he bunted down the third base line, and either beat Third Baseman Corriden's throw to first or else Corriden's throw. Another time, Cobb grounded to Wallace, who threw wild to first base. Once Lajoie bunted to Corriden, who tossed it to first base. Lajoie was credited with a sacrifice hit. It was necessary for Lajoie to have eight hits in order to pass Cobb in the batting order in each game, and obtained as many hits.

Phishers Deny Charge. Lajoie and other players deny that there was no trickery whatever, merely cleverness and misjudgment combined. Malloy and Nelson were the St. Louis pitchers yesterday, and in other game that Malloy pitched against Cleveland Lajoie got one hit in three innings. Nelson never pitched to Lajoie before.

Matter Looks Suspicious. Detroit, Mich., October 10.—Frank J. Navin, president of the Detroit American League baseball club, declared today that the hitting of Lajoie in St. Louis was suspicious.

Really Deserved Nine Hits. Cleveland, Oct. 10.—President B. B. Johnson of the American League, to-day announced that no more prizes would be offered or permitted while he continued at the head of the baseball organization.
