BORDER OF MEXICO CLOSELY GUARDED

(Continued From First Page.) The presidency six years hence, and through them he was enabled to purchase large quantities of arms and ammunition, this fact not being known until after the revolution broke out. The arms were smuggled into Mexico largely by fording the Rio Grande southwest of this city, in a remote ranch region. The Madero estates of Coahuila extend many miles along the

Mexico side of the river at the point where the crossing was made. During his operations here Madero talked freely of his opposition to the Diaz regime, but spoke of a peaceable revolution and denied any complicity with the revolutionary junta that has existed here for two years. The Madero family is the wealthiest in Northern Mexico. The loyalty of other members of the family has never been questioned, with the exception of the father and brothers of Francisco. The vast resources of this branch of the family are supposed to be available for the use of the leader in the present outbreak. During the more than forty days that Madero spent in this country he was in constant communication at one of the leading family hotels here with visitors from all sections of Mexico. Just before Madero left to join the

insurrectionists in Mexico shipments of arms to friends of his in this city were apprehended, and the fact became known that he was actively leading the revolutionary party. FARMERS' INSTITUTES ALONG THE DANVILLE AND WESTERN (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) Danville, Va., November 23.—Farmers' institutes will be held on December 5, 6 and 7, at various points along the Danville and Western Railway. A special train will be operated over the Danville and Western Railroad under the auspices of the Department of Agriculture and Immigration. Subjects of vital importance will be discussed, and it is expected that the farmers generally will take advantage of the opportunity offered them for instruction and practical demonstration in farm work. Points visited will be Cascade, Axton, Spencer, Stuart and Patrick Springs.

NEW RAILROAD IS COMPLETED

Honor of Driving Last Spike Falls to Lot of Mrs. A. L. Cornell.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) Winston-Salem, N. C., November 23.—The last rail was laid and the last spike driven on the Winston-Salem Southbound Railroad at 1:05 o'clock this afternoon by Mrs. A. L. Cornell, wife of the assistant to the chief engineer. This happy honor occurred near the immense plant of the Whitney Power Company. The new road, which runs from Winston-Salem to Wadesboro, a distance of ninety-three miles, will be operated by the Atlantic Coast Line which owns a half interest in the enterprise, the other half belonging to the Norfolk and Western. The first through passenger train will be operated on the Southbound on Friday from Wadesboro to Winston-Salem. It will carry officials of every county through which the road runs. The Southbound is one of the best railroads ever constructed in the South, and its completion will be celebrated in this city December 15.

DRAINAGE CONVENTION CONCLUDES ITS PROGRAM

Wilmington, N. C., November 23.—With the re-election of all principal officers, the selection of Elizabeth City, N. C., as the next place of meeting, and the adoption of a platform favoring a course in drainage engineering at the State Agricultural and Mechanical College, the teaching of agriculture in the public schools, the exemption of drainage bonds from taxation for fifteen years, and provision by the State for a drainage engineer and the establishment of a demonstration farm where alluvial soils exist, the third annual convention of the North Carolina Drainage Convention came to a close to-day with an outing on the United States revenue cutter Seminole. More than 200 delegates were in attendance.
