"I don't believe in restriction of the birth rate can be supported, either by morals or economics. The durable satisfactions of life depend upon having the normal number of children, and the normal number of children is five or six to the family. A mother should bear a child every two years."

"Granting that marriage should come at the average age of twenty-four, this periodical child-bearing should continue until the mother is forty, resulting in eight children. This high number, however, would be lowered in average by the death of either parent or two or more of the children. I believe in monogamy, equal rights between men and women, and the normal birth rate."

COALMEN ATTACK TRUST LAW

Say It Is Ruining Their Industry, Especially the Small Operator.

Chicago, February 12.—At a coal operators' convention here the anti-combination law, which prevents the operators of Illinois and Indiana from uniting to regulate prices, was declared to be the ruin of the industry and driving the small operator into bankruptcy.

"Mammoth coal mines in Illinois and Indiana are closed down or working half time, and coal is said to be selling below actual cost of production. The demand is light, and the trade is demoralized, according to the operators, who are protesting against the law and means of improving the situation. A committee was appointed to prepare an amendment to the antitrust laws to allow the operators to combine to maintain steady and uniform prices."

QUIET IS RESTORED

For a Time Race War Threatens Mississippi Town.

Gambou, Miss., February 12.—Following a clash with a number of negroes last night, in which one negro was killed and another wounded, a third negro has been arrested, and the town has recovered its composure. The root of the trouble was in the existence of a house on the outskirts of the town where gambling was said to have been carried on. A posse of citizens attempted to surround the place, and the exchange of shots followed. For a while the town was in a state of confusion, and a serious clash was believed inevitable. Early this morning, however, the negro was released, and quiet was restored.



GHOULS' CAPTURE BELIEVED NEAR

Detectives Say They Have Disccovered Reason for the Desecration.

El Paso, February 12.—The mystery of the desecration of the Scott mausoleum, it is said, will be solved very soon by the arrest of the ghouls. Gilbert Perkins, who heads the detective force working on the case, is authority for this statement. He declares he and his men know who the miscreants are and where they can be found. They believe the desecration of some of the bodies in the mausoleum, which is the real sensation of the whole affair is yet to come. That they were ordered to get none but the body of Mrs. L. Scott is the theory on which some of the detectives are working. All the bodies are positively known to be in the mausoleum. The motive of the vandals is said to be known, but cannot be divulged.

How the body of Mrs. Anna McCullion, supposed to have been stolen from the Scott mausoleum, was discovered was told by Mrs. C. H. Strong, niece of the dead woman and daughter of the late Congressman William L. Scott. "Detective Perkins and his son," said Mrs. Strong, "went to the tomb with me to make a thorough examination of the place, and we found the body of Mrs. Anna McCullion, my aunt, at first believed to have been stolen. The body was in a crypt which had never been opened. The door was behind the door, and was pulled open, as was the one during our first visit Wednesday evening, after the desecration of the mausoleum was reported. In the hasty examination of the place made by my husband and I overlooked this compartment."

SCOTT'S BODY NOT MOLESTED

"We looked only in the vaults that had contained bodies. We saw that the body of my aunt was missing, and naturally believed that it had been removed from the tomb. It was only after a search of almost two hours yesterday during which we opened nearly all the vaults, which had been sealed, that we discovered the right one. The cover of the vault containing Mrs. McCullion's body had been cleverly replaced, so that it presented the same appearance as others which had not been tampered with."

"The body of my father, William L. Scott, has not been touched, although there were a few marks upon the crypt cover. My mother's casket had been pulled partly from the niche, but it was not broken into. "The casket containing the corpse of my aunt was almost demolished, but the body had not been removed. Coffins containing the bodies of John McCullion, Richard Townsend and his baby, Anna Townsend, were not harmed. Silver nameplates and ornaments were torn from several. "Members of my family and I have remained silent concerning the affair because we were intent on catching the ghouls and we were convinced that the chances of so doing would practically be ruined were we to talk of the outrage."

"Now that the body has been found and Mr. Perkins assures us arrests are certain, it is different."

NEGRO IS LYNCHED

Twenty Prominent Citizens Take Him From Officers.

Eufaula, Ala., February 12.—Iver Peterson, a negro about eighteen years old, was lynched early this morning by twenty of the most prominent citizens of Eufaula. His body was strung up to a limb andiddled with bullets. Last night about 7 o'clock a Mr. E. A. Hudson, a prominent woman of Eufaula, was going from a neighbor's house to her home a negro, who was named as Peterson, grabbed her. Her screams brought several of her neighbors to the scene in a few moments, and the negro fled. Peterson was captured this morning at 6 o'clock at his father's house, just down the street from the home of Congressman Henry D. Clayton. Deputy Bayly, accompanied by Mr. Spencer, in the latter automobile, started with the negro for Clayton, the county seat, fearing that a lynching might result. In the eighth mile from Eufaula, on the Clayton Road, the automobile was halted by a mob of citizens and the negro quickly rushed into the woods nearby, where he was lynched.

DROP 37 MIDSHIPMEN

They Fall in Their Studies in the Half-Yearly Examinations.

Washington, D. C., February 12.—For failure in studies at their recent semi-annual examinations, thirty-seven midshipmen have been dropped from the rolls of the Naval Academy at Annapolis. The recommendation of the Academic Board to that effect was approved by Acting Secretary of the Navy, Winthrop.

Of the boys who failed, three were in the first class, eight in the second, five in the third, and twenty-one in the fourth.

NAVARRO FAILS TO REACH JUAREZ

Fearing Mines Under Tracks, He Proceeds at Snail's Pace.

RECEPTION IS POSTPONED

Federals Said to Be Executing Old and Defenseless People.

El Paso, Texas, February 12.—Jefe Dolores Martinez's public reception to General Navarro, set for to-day, has been indefinitely postponed. General Navarro did not arrive. An insurrecto courier located the Federal leader at a lake a few miles southwest of Ahumada, a station on the Mexican Central Railroad about eighty miles south.

The insurrecto forces are scattered between Ahumada and Juarez, wherever they can find pasture and water. The country for a hundred miles south of here practically is deserted.

Manuel Casillas, probably the best educated of the insurrecto leaders, who has been in El Paso at a council of war for three days, was captured by American soldiers at Ysleta to-day. Casillas was trying to get across the river to join his command. He carried a rifle in violation of the neutrality laws, and was taken into custody.

Navarro, fearing mines under the tracks or bridges, is said to be proceeding at a snail's pace. The track is inspected ahead of the train, which together with the repairs he is compelled to make, makes his advance a tedious one.

A letter received by the local junta to-day from a sympathizer at Shafter, Tex., purported to show that the Federals have not forsaken the practice of executing the defenseless.

The letter states that Tom Perrien, a river guard, saw the recent night taken out and shot, although unarmed and defenseless.

"One of them," the letter says, "was partly blind and paralyzed, and was seventy-five years old; another was eighty-two."

The insurrecto board of strategy held a meeting at Saratoga, on the Mexican side, twelve miles east of here to-day. Their plans were not divulged.

Newspaper men penetrated the desert twelve miles south of Juarez to-day without catching sight of troops of either side.

Wingfield died a few days later, and a post-mortem examination failed to locate the teeth. His widow sued the physicians for malpractice, but the lower court held there was no sufficient evidence to warrant the case going to the jury. The Supreme Court decided differently, and ordered the physicians to trial by jury.

POMP AND PAGEANTRY WILL SURPASS ALL SIMILAR OCCASIONS IN ENGLAND.

2,000,000 VISITORS EXPECTED

Building Sites and Windows Are Held at Highest Prices Ever Quoted.

London, February 12.—Since the beginning of the winter the chief functionaries of the British court have been busily absorbed with preparations for the coronation of George V. in historical interest all former ceremonies of the character.

While the ceremony of crowning the King and Queen in Westminster Abbey on June 22 will be almost identical in form with that which has been followed in the investiture of British sovereigns since William IV, and Queen Adelaide, the auxiliary functions are expected to exceed in pageantry and magnificence anything that has been witnessed in the past.

These will include the progress of the court through London the day after the coronation and a visit to the Guildhall with a reception to the King and Queen by the city authorities there, a great naval review, a gala performance at the opera with minor celebrations and pageants, among which will be a "festival of empire" at the Crystal Palace.

Business men and transportation companies count upon an influx of something approaching 2,000,000 visitors to London during the coronation season. A considerable proportion of these will be foreigners, Americans and colonials probably predominating. Hotels expect to be able to cope with the invasion.

Every indication that the erection of stands for witnessing the procession to the abbey and the progress through London will be on a scale more extensive than for the coronation of King Edward in 1902.

Contractors are asking the highest prices ever quoted for building sites and windows. A lively insurance business has begun at Lloyd's against the death of the King, any event necessitating the postponement of the coronation, and against bad weather.

Dr. Davidson, the present Archbishop of Canterbury, will officiate in the abbey, in succession to the aged Archbishop Temple, who crowned King Edward.

The recently appointed Dean of Westminster, Dr. Ryle, who is at present Bishop of Winchester, will assist the archbishop, placing the imperial mantle and pall of cloth of gold on the King's shoulders. This mantle is being made by the Royal School of Art Needlework.

From the end of this month to the coronation Westminster Abbey will be closed to visitors while workmen are engaged preparing the building for the occasion.

Several of the highest officials of the state, constituting the Court of Claims, have been sitting in solemn conclave wearing their uniforms, robes of office and orders to pass upon and to certify the various noblemen and knights to be seated at the coronation in the ceremony to be held at the abbey.

The dean and chaplain of Westminster have the right to retain the robes and ornaments, the Earl of Shrewsbury a sword, a white wand and a Lord High Steward of Ireland, the Duke of Newcastle to provide a glove and support the King's right arm, while holding the sceptre by virtue of the tenure of the Manor of Workshop, and the Duke of the Cinque ports to bear canopies.

Various other hereditary rights were confirmed by the court.

TOIL-CRAZED WIFE A SUICIDE

At 22 She Had Been Married and a Drudge for Eight Years.

New York, February 12.—Grown old at twenty-two, and weary of the toil of stitching garments and tending babies and cooking for a husband who had wed at the age of fourteen, Alberta Cantanzaro laid down her burden in her home at 118 Elizabeth Street. She shot herself in the temple with a large-caliber revolver.

The report of the weapon did not awaken the two children—Giuseppe, three, and Michele, two years old. The head of the family, Ignazio Cantanzaro, a longshoreman, had gone to work before his wife's break-up. She had gathered together a big bundle of garments that she was to sew and stitch upon all day. For eight years her life had been consecrated to manifold drudgery.

FIFTY YEARS AN EDITOR

Brother of Dr. Parkhurst Quits on Account of Illness.

Clinton, Mass., February 12.—Wellington E. Parkhurst, for the last forty-five years editor of the Clinton County, a weekly, and for the last twenty years editor of the Item, a daily, issued from the same office, by his resignation on account of illness concluded his services with both
