McFARLAND CLAIMS HE IS CHAMPION

Any One Desiring to Contest Matter May Apply in Person at His Peril. New York, March 16.—(Special to The Times-Dispatch.)—The pending retirement from the ring of Ad Wolgast, lightweight champion, had aroused interest to a statement issued here by Luecky McFarland, in which the latter alleges, at considerable length, that he is only real Simon-pure lightweight champion boxer recognized by the world. He declares that any one desiring to contest his claim may apply in person at his peril. The only reason that his championship claim is not recognized, he says, is because of a little matter of a couple of pounds in weight. His statement goes into details on this proposition of weight. "The weight question," he says, "seems to be the bone of contention with champions who wish to sidestep a challenge. The lightweight limit in this country is 132 pounds. Under my agreement with Moran, I made 135 pounds without difficulty, and I am confident that I can fight at the 132-pound limit. What is more, I am beaten, and I think this record counts for something in support of my claim that I am the legitimate champion. I am of history that Lavigne, Erne and Gans all won the title at weights above the 132-pound limit."
