RAPID INCREASE IN MANUFACTURING

Census Figures Show Big Gain in Output of Richmond Factories.

71 PER CENT. IN FIVE YEARS. Eighty Establishments Were Added in Years From 1904 to 1909.

According to a preliminary statement issued yesterday by Census Director Durand, an immense growth in Richmond's manufacturing activities was scored in the five years from 1904 to 1909.

The summary shows percentages of increase as follows: 106 per cent. in the number of salaried officials and clerks; 92 per cent. in the miscellaneous expenses; 76 per cent. in the cost of materials used; 71 per cent. in the value of products; 65 per cent. in the value added by manufacture; 57 per cent. in the salaries and wages; 27 per cent. in the number of establishments, and 19 per cent. in the average number of wage earners.

There was a decrease of 1 per cent. in the capital invested.

There were 350 establishments in 1909, as compared with 260 in 1904, an increase of 80, or 27 per cent.

The value of products in 1909 was \$47,355,000 and \$27,745,000 in 1904, an increase of \$19,610,000, or 71 per cent.

EXPERTS WILL BE CALLED BY STATE

Alienists Ready in Case Insanity Is Defense of Henry Beattie.

PROSECUTION IS READY. Fully Expects Trial Next Week. Fuller Liberty Allowed Paul Beattie.

In order to be prepared for any emergency that may arise the State will summon several experts in insanity for the trial of Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., merely to be ready in the event that the defense offers a plea of insanity.

While not at all certain that the defense will enter such a plea, the attorneys for the State have no intention of being caught napping.

Witnesses Not III. Emphatic denials were given yesterday to stories of illness on the part of the State witnesses, Eulach Binford and Paul Beattie, Jr.

Special Agent Scherer said yesterday that many rumors were being spread in an evident effort to secure a postponement of the case.

The prosecution is ready to-day," he stated emphatically. "We have notified our witnesses to be at Chesterfield Courthouse on Monday morning."

Under an order from Judge Watson, of the Chesterfield Circuit Court, additional liberty will be given to Paul Beattie as the result of advice of Acting Jail Physician Bright.

Gans-Rady Company WILL BUILD HOTEL ON GRACE STREET

Site Once Destined for Theatre to Be Covered by Hostelry.

Having abandoned the site at Eighth and Grace Streets as a location for the proposed Lyric Theatre, as announced in The Times-Dispatch yesterday, the project will be utilized by Henry S. Wallerstein, it is understood, for the purpose of building a seven-story hotel, which will cost \$150,000.

Plans for the new hotel are more or less in embryo, but it was learned from an authoritative source last night that if no obstacles are encountered the project will be carried out.

Though there has not yet appeared any word from either of the two churches in the vicinity of the location of the contemplated hotel, it was thought to be probable that further protests may be forthcoming from that source, because a hostelry, as is proposed, among its other features would include a bar, and as the plan to establish a theatre met with vigorous protests from the churches, it has been deduced that a cafe, where strong drink would be served in such proximity to the houses of worship would bring forth objection as strenuous as those which defeated the theatrical project.

This question was raised at the time the Richmond Hotel was built at Ninth and Grace, but was satisfactorily adjusted when the owners placed the bar in such a manner as to be entered upon Ninth Street only.

It is believed that if the new hotel is put up at Eighth and Grace Streets, the expected difficulty will be overcome if the bar is situated in the rear with an entrance upon Eighth Street.

Unusual Charge. Charles Neitz was locked up yesterday afternoon, being charged with running a hand-car laden with beer and other good things, up the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway and ditching it a few miles west of the city. Neitz's alleged offense occurred April 9 last. He gave himself up.

WOMAN THROWS ACID AT DENTIST HAER ALL CASES

Called to Collect Alleged Debt and Quickly Became Violent.

Dora Mitchell, a white woman giving her age as thirty years, was arrested last night by Policeman Carter on the charge of assaulting and burning with carbolic acid, Dr. C. E. Pearson, a dentist of 203 East Main Street.

According to reports, the woman, who later, it is stated, will be arraigned under a lunacy warrant, after annoying a number of people concerning an imaginary debt of \$6, went to Dr. Pearson's office last night, demanding that he pay the money.

Dr. Pearson said last night that he had no idea why the woman should have come to him, as he had not seen her for some time, though he knew of her having called at several other places. She showed no violence, however, until she called at his office.

The Mitchell woman went to the police station quietly, and was taken without any trouble to the First Station, where there are quarters for women. On her arrival there, however, she demanded that the warrant be read to her before she would consent to being locked up.

TRUE REFORMERS MAY PAY CLAIMS

Richmond Members Favor Plan to Settle With Bank Depositors.

Richmond delegates and members of the True Reformers put themselves overwhelmingly on record last night as favoring the resolution adopted last week to the effect that depositors of the defunct savings bank of the Grand Fountain of the Order join in a petition to the court to order its property released to the colored order on condition that it assume all obligations to the depositors upon such terms as may be agreed upon.

J. Thomas Newsome, of Newport News, attorney for the involved order, discussed the legal aspect of the proposed action and spoke of its advisability from the viewpoint of the law. He expressed himself as strongly for the plan, seeing in it the best solution of the difficulty.

A resolution was offered by Dr. W. H. Smith, who presided at last night's meeting, supporting the action of the committee on procedure, and commending it for its service in bringing the alleged wreckers of the bank to trial. It was unanimously adopted.
